No less than ten applications have been received by High Sheriff Albion R. Foster from points in the state of Maine, quoting a price to execute Benny Swim, who is condemned to die on July 15. A letter received from a nearby Maine town, concerning the execution, concludes with: "I will be pleased to do the work for \$300, etc.' One very sealous New Englander drove up to the sheriff's office in a big touring car and asked for a private interview, which was granted. When the caller had announced his desire to perform the execution, the unusually placed sheriff informed him that his desire and those c' other gentlemen from over the border, would not be considered for a moment and surely indicated a depravity that was unspeakable. The man was uncere moniously ejected from the office.

In speaking of the matter, Sheriff. Foster said: "In nearly every mail I get a letter offering services for this execution and it is hard to believe that such moral degeracy exists, as I consider men of the calibre degenerated in every sense of the word.
