AGITATION FOR ELECTRIC JUICE

Citizens Interested and Agitation
May Bear Fruit

Lieut. R. W. Lindsay of Fredericton has been visiting Mrs. Lindsay's friends here and manifests a great interest in the establishment of a local electric plant. A number of local business men attended a meeting in M. L. Hayward's office on Monday evening and heard Lieut. Lindsay's proposal, which was that a crude oil engine be employed to furnish about 50 horse power. The lieutenant was not able to give details of the cost nor of the service that could be produced, but, on the other hand, the community has a very definite idea of what they need. Various industries will require from 5 to 60 h. p. each or a total of a 100 h. p. per day. Any lighting system that does not give light as quickly and as continuously as a kerosene lamp is unworthy the name of electric light. A 24 hour service is demanded. It has been established that electricity can be profitably used for the transmission of natural powers, and in its use this way it has all other forces beaten to a frazzle. Its possibilities are power, light, and heat, in any quantity where ever and whenever it is wanted. If experts will examine the opportunities for power at the mouth of the Beaguine and Little Presque Isle they will find there in either case, capacity of 1000 h. p. per diem. It has been going to waste for millions of years; let us hope it will not continue so.
