London, April 27.—A message to the Evening News from Copenhagen quotes the German councillor of state as saying that systematic efforts were being inaugurated in Germany for the purchase of sufficient foodstuffs for a four-year supply. This is being done, it is said, on instructions to German chambers of commerce from Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the imperial chancellor on the ground that Germany must be prepared for at least this length of time.

JAPAN AMENDS ITS DEMANDS

Pekin, April 28.—With the new draft of the Japanese demands on China now in the hands of the Chinese foreign minister, Lu Cheng-Hsiang, interest is aroused in the nature of the modifications which Japan has made in the original document. President Yuan Shi Kai and his advisers have carefully examined the demands as amended, but no decision has been reached and they are likely to be the subject of further discussions.

TURKS REPORT A DEFEAT FOR ALLIES

Constantinople, April 27.—The Turkish war department today gave out the following statement: "Under the protection of warships the enemy attempted to land troops Sunday at four points on the west coast of Gallipoli, namely at the mouth of Sighindere, on the coast in the district of Avburnu to the west of Kabeleph on the coast of Takeburun and in the neighborhood of Kum Kaleh. "The troops of the enemy which landed at Takeburun were forced to retreat at the point of the bayonet and were pushed back to the coast. Part of these forces on Monday evening were obliged hastily to return to their ships, the Turkish attacks at all points are progressing satisfactorily. "Simultaneously a fleet approached the Dardanelles to force the straits but it was obliged to retreat before our fire. "The forces of the enemy which landed at Kum Kaleh advanced under the protection of warships, but despite a heavy bombardment from all sides our troops drove them back to the coast. The enemy lost 400 killed and 200 taken prisoners. "Our losses were insignificant. "A party of Moslem troops who landed with the French troops on this point of the coast deserted the French and joined our forces. "Before Kabeleph we captured a number of English and Australian soldiers, among them a captain and a lieutenant.

COLLEGES BANISH ALCOHOL Oxford, Eng., April 27.—It was announced today that Jesus college has decided to bar alcoholic beverages while the war continues. Similar action has been taken by Oriol. It is expected that other colleges will do likewise and that the entire university will soon bar alcoholic drinks.

QUIET SAYS VIENNA Vienna, April 27.—The following official communication was issued today: "Nowhere over the whole front have events of any special importance been reported. In several sectors there were violent artillery duels. "In the Carpathians the Russians suspended their operations against our positions after having suffered severe losses."

CRICKETS DESTROY CROPS

Spokane, April 27.—Six hundred acres of wheat have been destroyed by crickets in the Wilson Creek country, according to a report today by C. W. Creel, of the federal department of agriculture. Millions of the insects have invaded the Wilson Creek valley and trenches three miles long have been plowed on the 6,000 acre farm of one rancher who has established a patrol of six men to destroy the insects. Governor Lister has been appealed to for \$10,000 to aid in the fight on the pests.

MORE LAND CLEARED

Victoria, April 27.—Reports received by the Hon. W. R. Ross, minister of lands, show that there has been a greatly increased activity in clearing land on the east side of Vancouver Island during the past winter, and that this work is continuing at the present time. The clearing has been extensive and has been very thorough; not mere slash-and-burn, but clearing with the object of raising crops. It is obvious that the settlers are busily engaged in the preliminaries of increased production, and the indications generally are most encouraging.

DEPARTMENT OF NAVAL SERVICE TENDERS WANTED

For wooden steamer for Fisheries Patrol Work in Northern Waters of British Columbia. Tenders are requested for a six months' charter of wooden steamer, not less than 80 feet long, 17 feet beam, with cabin accommodation for two officials in addition to crew. Steamer must be in first class repair and subject to inspection by Boiler and Hull Inspectors. Crew and maintenance will be provided by the Department of Naval Service, but all tools required in engine room must be provided by the owner of steamer. Speed required, not less than nine knots per hour. Tenders must quote rate per day for six months' charter, and boat must be available for service immediately on acceptance of tender. 
