Will Cede Territory as Far as Vardar River in Macedonia Balkan Alliance.

Sofia, Sept. 10-Several days agó the Serbian minister here declared officially to the Bulgarian government that Serbia was ready to cede territory as far as the Vardar river anxious to maintain a common border with Greece
