We also hope before many seasons have passed over us through the instrumentality of the friends of total abstinence that the accomplishment of that which has already been so nearly carried into effect even the prohibition by law of all liquor traffic; will from the large majority of our inhabitants in favor of it receive the moral assent of council and Assembly.
