LONDON, Oct. 8. A Rome despatch says King Humbert has granted a decree of amnesty to Col. Canzio, General Garibaldi's son-in-law.

PARNELL AND THE LAND LEAGUE. A Dublin despatch says—The proceedings at the reception of landlords by the Lord-Lieutenant were strictly private, and the landlords present had a statement to make which they would not venture to publish in public. Some said they were themselves in danger of assassination in consequence of the Land League agitation; others pointed out that if the Lord-Lieutenant were in imminent peril, others still told the Lord-Lieutenant they might not get home alive.
