JEFFRIES NOT IN IT!

By the Referee. Reno, July 4.—The following statement is by Tex Rickard: "Johnson is the most wonderful fighter that ever pulled on a glove.

By the Time-keeper. Reno, July 4.—By George Hartling, official time-keeper: "Time was called at 2.45. Johnson entered the ring at 2.26 and Jeffries entered four minutes later.

By Jack Johnson. Reno, July 4.—I won from Mr. Jeffries because I outclassed him in every department of the fighting game.

clinch, Johnson shoving Jeffries away. Jeffries walked in and hooked left to neck and sent clinch sent right to body. Johnson responded with a left, and they continued to stand breast to breast, trying for short inside blows.

ROUND TWO—Jeff assumed his crouch but missed the first attempt. Jack forced and Jeffries stepped nimbly away. Jack went for Jeffries and then ripped in. They held together and were willing to give each other any chance.

ROUND THREE—Jeffries sailed in and led for head but missed. Johnson hooked stiff left to the body and right to the head, but neither blow was hard.

ROUND FOUR—Jeffries took a crouching position and walked in. He missed and they began an exchange of talk. Jeffries put left to face and started blood from Johnson's lips.

ROUND FIVE—Jeffries tried to land left both sparred and Jeffries sent left for body which was blocked. In a clinch both tried to face and the round ended. Jeffries' round.

ROUND SIX—Jeffries crouched on the opening of the round. They stood around each other. Johnson pounded in two stiff lefts to the face. One of them cut Jeffries' cheek.

ROUND SEVEN—Jeffries walked in but before he had a chance Jack led with right and missed. Jeffries' eye was closed and badly swollen.

ROUND EIGHT—"Come on, Jeffries," said Johnson as they faced each other. Jeffries came on and got a left to the face. He missed Johnson's body with a left, and took two lefts to the face.

ROUND NINE—Jeffries stood up and walked into a left to the chest. "Make him fight," yelled Corbett. "Never mind, just wait," replied Johnson. Johnson walked in and tried left for the body.

ROUND TEN—They came up slowly. Jack shot a left to the face, but

Jeffries brushed it away, and responded with a left to the body. Jack again missed a light right for the face, Jeffries put his shoulder against Johnson's. At close range Johnson sent a left uppercut to Jeffries' face.

ROUND ELEVEN—They walked up carefully. Jeffries tried his left to the face three times, but missed and talked to Jack. They broke away and Johnson sent a stiff left uppercut to the face and right to the body. He kept Jeff bobbing his head to escape a right uppercut whenever they came together in a clinch.

ROUND TWELVE—Jeffries walked forward waiting for a chance to get inside the negro's defence. Jack simply waited, and then drew a blow and hooked a left to the face. "Thought you said you were going to have me wild," said Johnson to Corbett. Jeffries forced his way in, and the round was a draw.

ROUND THIRTEEN—Putting his right glove before his face Jeffries walked into a clinch with Johnson. When they broke Johnson sent a left to the body and a right uppercut to the chin. "Stick there, Jim!" shouted Corbett. Jeffries stuck immediately, but he was forced away. Then he took two lefts and right uppercut to the face. Holding him right on the shoulder, Johnson sent in three lefts to the face in quick succession and then uppercut to the forehead.

ROUND FOURTEEN—Jeffries walked into a left to the face twice and blocked Jeffries' attempts at close fighting. Jeffries took three straight to the face and got in a left to the face. Jeffries' lefts were blocked by Johnson before they could get within six inches of his face.

ROUND FIFTEEN—When the men faced each other, it was plain to all that Jeffries was in distress. His face was puffed and bleeding from the punishing blows he had received. He stumbled after the elusive negro, sometimes crouching low with his left hand stuck out in front of him, and sometimes standing erect.

His first knock down. Johnson dashed at him like a tiger. A rain of lefts and rights delivered at close quarters sent Jeffries reeling blindly. his side and right elbow he looked around in a dazed way and got up at the count of nine. While he was down Johnson stood almost over him until Richard waved him back. He stood ready to strike and when Jeffries rose from his knees he dashed in again. Jeffries reeled about and tried to clinch but Johnson eluded him, and as the former champion swung round to the south side of the ring, Johnson hit him twice on the jaw. Jeffries sank to his knees, weak and tired, but got up again at the count of nine.

It was then that Jeffries' friends began to call to Rickard to stop the fight. "Stop it, stop it," they shouted from all sides. "Don't let him be knocked out," Rickard gave no heed to these appeals. Jeffries was helpless now and as he staggered to a standing position the negro was waiting for him. A left, a right, and another left, short, powerful blows, found their mark on Jeffries' chin and he went down for the third time. Again he sprang over the lower ropes, hanging half outside the ring. The time-keeper raised and lowered his arm, tolling off the seconds. He had reached the count of seven when some of Jeffries' seconds put foot inside the ropes and Rickard walked between the fallen man and the negro champion. Placing his hand on Johnson's shoulder, he declared him the winner. Jeffries

was not counted out, but this merely was a technical evasion. It was evident that he could never have got up within ten seconds.
