Miss Alice Noel, principal of the school, occupied the chair and introduced the lecturer. Mr. Nichols made a strong appeal showing the necessity for drawing as a part of the education of a child, and then showed his audience the many improvements in modern methods of Art education. Twenty-eight teachers and pupil teachers were present, and were kept quite busy taking notes of the lecture and copying the numerous illustrations the lecturer sketched at that session during the two days of Thursday and Friday.  
At the close a very cordial vote of thanks was unanimously passed by the teachers, to the lecturer, on the notion of Mr. John Davis, Principal of the Methodist Superior School, and Mr. Gilroy, of the St. C. School. The convention closed by singing the National Anthem.  
The teachers of Harbor Grace are full of enthusiasm on the subject of drawing, feeling assured that they can, with the new light and help given, hope to teach it more successfully than before. Their strong desire is that, if possible, Mr. Nichols should come often to watch the progress of the work.

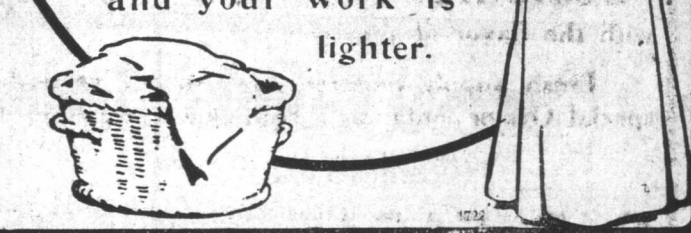

## THE EXHIBITION.

### PRIZES AWARDED.

Yesterday being the second day of the Exhibition crowds were in attendance throughout the whole day. It is estimated that there were ten thousand people entered the Agricultural Hall yesterday. The place looked very attractive when lighted up with thousands of electric bulbs. The decorations were very much admired and reflect great credit on those who had any part in the work. The display of poultry was very satisfactory, and for variety, beauty, size, etc., could not be easily excelled in the most favored farming countries. Over 1,000 people sent in exhibits, a fact which shows the interest that is being taken in the show all over the country. In the fancy work department there are over 100 articles, and they have been sent in from the most distant points of the country. The exhibition of the dairy produce yesterday was favorably commented on by the judges—Mr. Moore and Dr. Standish. They are very favorably impressed with the whole display, and expressed the belief that this Colony should never be obliged to import any of the root crops exhibited yesterday at the Rink. The cabbage, potatoes and turnips were equally well displayed in Canada, a proof that the Newfoundland soil was capable of all the enthusiasts had claimed for it. The hay was particularly good, and judged from the specimens of oats, etc., that were required for home consumption could be raised in Newfoundland. Dr. Standish is a high authority on such matters and has knowledge of agriculture second to none in Canada. He comes from the Truro College of Agriculture. Mr. S. J. Moore is from the Ottawa Agricultural Department. He also expresses himself as being very much surprised at the excellence of the specimens of farm products. The root crops were fine, but could be improved up on with more care and attention, especially the potatoes. He had been present at seven such exhibitions the past year and that of Newfoundland would compare very favorably with the best of the world. He had been pleased with the poultry show, which he thought the second best that he had seen this season. The Exhibition Halls are becoming a favorite resort for the people of the city. The place was thronged up to the closing hour last night. In the afternoon all the school children visited the Rink and spent an hour or more viewing the exhibits. The C. C. ## Placentia Notes.

Mr. P. F. O'Rielly arrived from St. John's on Friday. Messrs. J. Fitzgibbon and M. E. Mulowney who were in St. John's joining the Knights of Columbus, also came by train the day preceding.  
Mr. J. Hanham, of the Anglo Office, is at present spending his vacation. Mrs. Leslie, of Whitbourne, is attending to the duties of the office while the former is off.  
A dance will be held in the Star Hall, on Monday, November 6th, for the benefit of the Society. No doubt it will be largely attended.  
Reports reach here from St. Brice's saying that a quantity of fish was stolen from Mr. J. F. Young; the amount is about 6 or 7 qds. Suspicion rests on a certain party who is at present on his way to the city by boat. He will be arrested and brought back here.

Dr. Lynch will have to remove the man's hand from the arm. The wish of the community is that he may soon recover, as he is a married man with two young children.
