"In these circumstances it is hardly likely that Germany will remain content to see the trade, if not the territory of Morocco divided between France and Spain without making a move of some kind. I should not therefore be surprised if before many cays have elapsed some overt action is not taken to assert the rights of Germany in Morocco. 

To Clean Gas Stoves.

1. Lift off all the bars from the to 2. Wash the top of the stove under the burners with hot soda water. 3. Clean the burners every now and then with an old brush dipped in paraffin if they are greasy.

Do not poke wire into the holes i the burners as this enlarges them and leads to an increased use of gas. 4. Wash bars with hot soda water and polish them with blacklead. unless the bars are of steel, when they must be cleaned with emery paper.

5. Clean the brass taps and fittings. 6. Scrape and wash the shelves with hot soda and water. 7. Replace all the parts.
