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Fourteen Arrested.

She had 32 at Balena, so that she has to date 54 fish. The last fish taken were fin-backs. The weather is stormy and the fish wild, rendering it difficult to kill them.

There is an old outhouse or stable on Hamilton Street which is a rendezvous for boys, especially on Sundays, and if the place is not boarded up they will eventually set fire to it, and perhaps with it burn other property in that section. Boys there have broken glass in the windows of a cooperage and also in private houses. The police should put them to rest.

Newfoundland May Now Take Up Reciprocity With the U.S.

Washington, Sept. 22.—No official declaration is expected at the State Department regarding the demise of the Reciprocity agreement, on the ground that the Canadian Government naturally supposes that the United States Government is familiar with the terms of the agreement, especially the condition that new and reduced duties shall not be effective until after Canadian ratification. The single exception was the wood pulp and paper schedule which by special provision went into operation immediately upon the approval of the Act, and is now beyond recall, unless Congress should see fit to repeal the entire Reciprocity Act.

The opinion expressed at the State Department was that no effort would be made to repeal the Reciprocity Act, and although the duties therein provided will not become effective, the Act itself will be permitted to remain on the statute books, constituting an over-kept door to Canada, and a constant reminder of the recognition by the United States of the merits of the principle of Reciprocity with its northern neighbor.

It was suggested to-day that the only chance for the continuance of Reciprocity as an open issue might be found in an attempt by Newfoundland to secure such a treaty of agreement with the United States. It has been known that the Newfoundlanders were only waiting the disposition of the pact between the United States and Canada to open negotiations with Washington for a Reciprocity arrangement on their own account, and State Department officials said it has been difficult to keep them from pressing the matter while the Canadian agreement was pending.

Cattle for Nfld.

Newfoundland is rapidly losing the reputation of being a country without cattle or horses. There are always more waiting at North Sydney than the Invermore can carry. On Thursday night the lot from which the selection was made included 200 sheep for the Newfoundland Government, which is booming sheep-raising, 18 horses for the Northcliffe concern at Grand Falls, and a lot of cattle for Sir Robert Bond.—Sydney Record.

State Witness Has Disappeared.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 21.—The sudden disappearance from Albuquerque, New Mexico, of D. K. Diekelman, an important witness for the State in the coming McNamara trial, was reported by wire here to the prosecution. He was reported to have left for Chicago.

Diekelman was night clerk at the New Baltimore Hotel in this city on September 22, 1910, forty-eight hours before the Times explosion when a man registered there "Q. B." Bryce. Diekelman is said by the authorities here to have identified J. B. McNamara later as the man who registered as "Bryce." The prosecution has been keeping in touch with him. Monday Diekelman sent a telegram to the authorities, it is said, declaring emissaries of the defence were trying to "talk with him." He asked what he should do, and was told to "leave the emissaries alone."

Found Murdered in Freight Car.

Newark, N. J., Sept. 21.—A well dressed man whose appearance indicated wealth and refinement, was found dead in a freight car here to-day with a bullet wound in his breast and his pockets turned inside out. The police believe that he was murdered.
