GHENT, Belgium, To-Day.

George Carpenter, French heavy-weight pugilist, to-day won the heavy-weight championship by knocking out Bombardier Wells, the British champion, in the fourth round.

HALIFAX, To-Day.

The cupola of a blast furnace in the Nova Scotia Car Works Foundry exploded on Saturday afternoon, and as a result George Spinnay, one of the workmen, is dead, and the foundry was destroyed by a fire which followed the explosion. The loss is estimated at \$20,000 and is covered by insurance.

MARQUETTE, Mich., To-Day.

Col. Roosevelt won a libel suit against Geo. A. Novett, who charged the Colonel with drunkenness and having waived damages after defendant had uttered a retraction, was awarded nominal damages of six cents, provided in such cases by the laws of Michigan. Each party to the suit will have to pay his own expenses.

HALIFAX, To-day.

The gales which swept the Nova Scotia coast on Friday and Saturday played havoc with the gear of the shore fishermen from Louisburg on the East to Yarmouth on the West. Fully 50 per cent. of the equipment was destroyed. At Green Island there is a small colony of fishermen and a fleet of nine motor crafts, all were lost save two, and of dozens of crates of lobsters awaiting snack, only two were saved. The same story comes from other points along the coast line. Several schooners are also ashore to Westward, among them an American fishing schooner, Arcadia, at Wolf Cove, partly laden with fish and is a total loss.

FUR BUYERS & SHIPPERS.

Regulations under Provisions of "The Game and Inland Fisheries Board Act."

1. Any person who engages in the business of buying or shipping the skins of fur-bearing animals in the Colony of Newfoundland shall obtain a license from the Game and Inland Fisheries Board as a fur-buyer or shipper; such license shall be valid only until the 31st day of December in the year of its issue. A fee of fifty cents (50 cents) for each fur-buyer or shipper's license shall be paid by the licensee to the person issuing same.

2. Every buyer of fur shall report to a Magistrate, Justice of the Peace or Sub-Collector, or to the Game and Inland Fisheries Board, St. John's, on a form provided for the purpose, the quantity and kind of all fur exported by him from the Colony. Residents shall report on or before December 31st, in every year, and non-residents shall report before leaving the Colony on or before December 31st, in every year.

NOTE.—Penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or, in default, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months. See "The Game and Inland Fisheries Board Act, 1910," and Regulation made thereunder.

Steamer on Holyrood Pond.

Mr. John Bona, the energetic lumber man of Salmonier, this year has done fine with his saw mill at Holyrood Pond. He had a big "croup" of men all winter, cut a great number of logs and will have a record cut of lumber. This mill is run by motor power derived from the waters of the river and the engine has a capacity of 75 h.p. Mr. Bona has a fine steamer of 36 tons running in this remarkable sheet of fresh water which is 22 miles long by 3 miles wide. The boat is used for towing the cut logs in the fall and winter, and the mill opens in the spring and this spring much cod, ling, hake and considerable halibut (some of large size) were taken there. There is a splendid forest growth all around the lake.

The Government cruiser Fiona, Capt. E. English, arrived from the West Coast at 10.30 a.m. yesterday. Thereafter halting up there on fishery and bait protection service and arrived at Trepassy Saturday week, spending a week there. She reports the fishery a failure to date on the West Coast, mostly due to the scarcity of bait. Morris's promises of cold storage depots used the transformation to be wrought by Trepassy, Lord, et al. to the contrary notwithstanding.

LONDON, June 1.

The Admiralty is now considering an enlarged British programme, necessitated by the Senate's rejection of the three proposed Canadian ships were essential to British Empire security, and also declared if Canada failed the Admiralty must supply the deficiency. Hence Churchill is now being called upon, despite Radical pacifists to present the necessary supplementary estimates. The Pall Mall Gazette says three ships must be provided in the last resort. We must provide them ourselves. 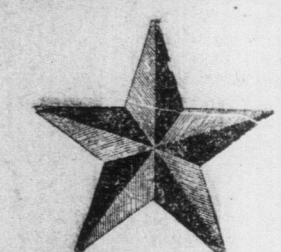
