ELOQUENT ADDRESSES IN BOTH CHAMBERS.

With a large attendance of citizen and in the presence of many distin guished visitors, His Excellency the Governor opened the fifth session of the Legislature yesterday afterncon After inspecting the naval and mili tary forces, the Governor proceeded to the Legislative Council Chamber and took his scat on the Throne. The Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod

mmoned the Speaker and Members f the House of Assembly to the Bar of the House. The Governor then read his Speech from the Throne, which was published in our columns yesterday. A copy having been delivered to the Speaker, the members of sembly Chamber. His Excellency and suite then left the House.

The Speech from the Throne having been re-read by the Clerk, Hon. John Anderson moved that an address in Anderson moved that an address in drew's Church, on Sunday next, at Anderson moved that an address in reply be sent to His Excellency. In an eloquent speech Mr. Anderson dealt mainly with the war, and showed how incomparable it was to all wars of the past in magnitude. He touched only briefly on local affairs, but showed how generally satisfactory but showed how generally satisfactory these are and how the future could e regarded with hope and courage. Hon. John Harvey seconded the motion in a quiet but impressive speech, which was mainly a plea for greater unity internally. He referred to the problems of living that confront the untry, and showed how even in that espect Newfoundland is fortunately laced. He regretted the failure of the two parties to come to an agreement and unite in the face of the common need, and made a convincing appeal to the country's representa-tives not to dissipate their energies at such a time in internal dissensions.

committee to draft an address in reply to the Governor's speech. Hon. Mr. Anderson gave notice that he would ask leave to-day to introduce a Daylight Saving Bill. The Council adjourned at 5.15 p.m. until 4.30 p.m. AT THE HOUSE.
