## Imperial Control of Coal, Steel and Iron.

British Supremacy in Industries the Object—D'Annunzio Not Wanted in Fiume—Dublin County Council Declares For Irish Republic—Premier Gouin's Successor Sworn In—Serbia Sends Ultimatum to Italy.

### AN EMPIRE INDUSTRY.

LONDON, July 9. Grant Morden, who arrived on the Mauretania, says he went to Canada in February full authority of the Premier to undertake the task on behalf of the Empire Steel Corporation, which had been accomplished means, the retention within the Empire of the great single control of the coal and steel deposits of the world, to make the Empire independent of foreign supplies and put the old world in a position to gain its supremacy in the coal, iron and steel industries.

### REPUDIATE D'ANNUNZIO.

FIUME, July 9. The repudiation of Gabriele D'Annunzio's authority as commander in chief was voiced by a group of Italian patriots who sent a protest to the National Council against the Autonomist Party. The protest was signed by one hundred

leaders in Fiume's business and professional life.

### BRITAIN LIQUIDATING HER DEBTS.

BUENOS AIRES, July 9. Arrangements have been made by the British Government to liquidate its debt of one hundred millions to Argentina. It is proposed to make this payment by meeting periodically the interest on Argentina's external debt held in London. The July 1 payment has been made and Great Britain has already liquidated half of her debt which was for payment for cereals, by the paying of obligations amounting to fifty millions which Argentina owed United States bankers.

### LETTS AID THE POLES.

COPENHAGEN, July 9. The Letts have gone to the assistance of the Poles around Divinsk, according to the Korno correspondent of the Berlingske Tidende. The Poles requested the Letts to take the war material which Poles were unable to

LONDON, July 9. A Berlin wireless despatch quotes the Vorwarts, Socialist organ, as saying that the Independent Socialists have refused to join the Spartacists and a split in the Independent party is possible.

### IRISH TROUBLES.

DUBLIN, July 9. The Dublin County Council has instructed its officials not to supply British Income Tax authorities any information on records. Such information will be given only by the Irish Republican Party. Many towns in the west and south as a precaution have adopted the rationing system on account of train stoppage. The Sinn Fein News Bureau asserts the British troops were sent to Cashel for the special purpose of removing the decorations erected on the occasion of the visit from Archbishop Hanna, San Francisco, and Bishop Cantwell, Los Angeles.

### NEW PREMIER A DELINQUENT.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 9. Hon. Arthur Meighen Premier Designate of Canada, may be among civil servants sued for non-payment of income tax. The others include several cabinet ministers.

### TASCHERAU SUCCEEDS GOUIN

QUEBEC, July 9. Hon. L. A. Taschereau, Attorney General of the Province was sworn in as Premier of Quebec, to-day.

### 48-HOUR WEEK.

GENOA, July 9. The International Seamen's Conference has adopted an amendment providing for an enforcement of the forty-eight hour week.

### BOLSHEVIKI SUCCESS.

LONDON, July 9. The Bolsheviks have captured Staro, Konstantinoff, forty miles from the Galician border, it was officially announced from Moscow yesterday.

### At the City Hall.

The first meeting of the Municipal Commission took place Thursday night at 8 p.m. The Secretary read the communication from the Colonial Secretary in which it was intimated that under the provisions of an act passed at the present session of the Legislature the following were appointed by the Governor-in-Council, a temporary Commission for the City of St. John's, and other purposes, viz.—W. G. Gosling, Isaac C. Morris, Charles P. Ayre, M.B.E., J. J. Mullaly and Nicholas J. Vinnicombe. Secretary Slattery was moved to the chair for the election of the Chairman. Mr. Gosling was unanimously elected, and Commissioner Mullaly was elected Vice-Chairman.

The first business taken up was the question of an assignment under the terms of the new charter. Final action was deferred until Monday. The question of making the number of the Board seven was discussed and the Government is to be asked to do so. The minutes of the last meeting of the Council were confirmed, then the pay rolls and bills for the week were passed.

A communication was read from the cashier of the Newfoundland Savings Bank in relation to the old loan from that institution. Action was deferred.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Public Works in relation to a water supply for the Tuberculosis Sanatorium and other institutions in the vicinity. The Commissioners decided they could not make any change in the offers already submitted and suggested the supply be taken from the ponds on the old Petty Harbor Road.

A petition was read from the labourers of St. John's West, for the regular Union scale of wages now in force. It was decided the Commissioners could not see their way clear to increase wages at the present time. This matter was dealt with by the late Council.

The following plans for houses and additions were approved: Mrs. Geo. Martin, house, Franklin Avenue; Mrs. Brennan, addition, Waldegrave St.; Mrs. P. Noel, addition, Water Street West, providing water and sewerage are installed; P. J. Butler, Casey St., provided he keeps to line of street given by City Engineer.

Wm. Cummings' plans were deferred. Thos. Walsh, addition, Parade St., granted.

The City Engineer reported progress of water and sewer pipe laying. Franklin Avenue, grading Duckworth Street, also Flavin Street; fixing Quidi Vidi Road and LeMarchant Road. Also the
