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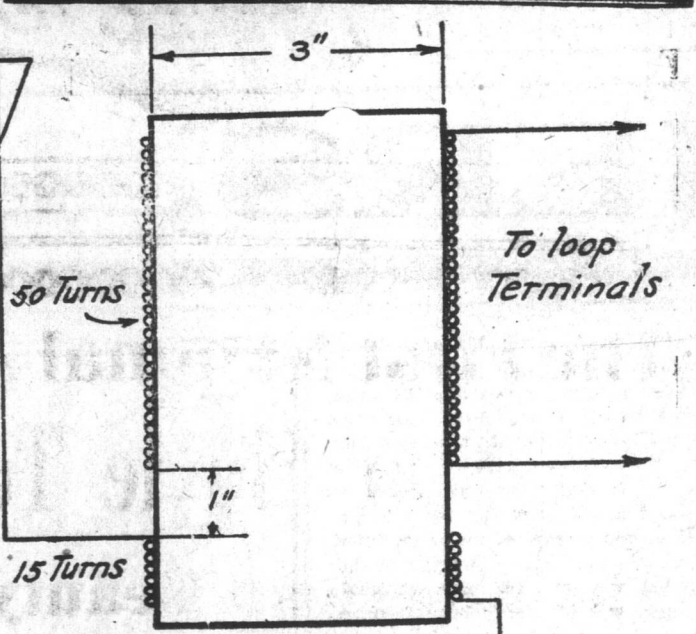
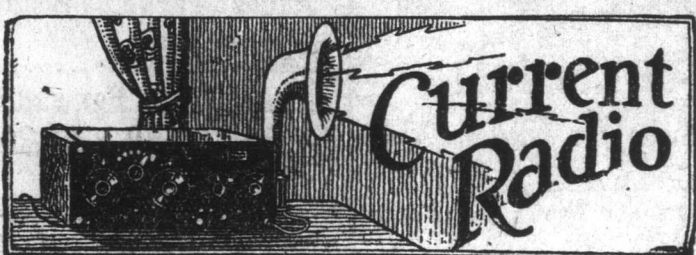

## The Super On An Antenna

EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.

Sometimes it is desirable to operate a superheterodyne with an indoor or outdoor antenna. This should be necessary only when extreme distance is wanted. The super does not have the same selectivity when operated on an antenna as it does when a loop is used. If an antenna is used it is perfectly possible to use a picture-molding type which could consist of a single insulated wire strung on or behind the picture-molding around the room. Its length in no case should exceed 40 feet.

A small coupler will be required to properly transfer the energy from the antenna to the super. Above we show a sketch of an antenna coupler for a super. The winding form can be cardboard or hard rubber and should be 3 inches in diameter. The primary, or antenna-ground, coil should consist of 15 turns of No. 22 D. C. magnet wire.
