Bartlett Advises Base on Alaskan Coast for Flight

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 3-(C. P.)-Aircraft ean be successfully utilized in polar exploration, providing the flights are attempted from a large base in Alaska, according to Captain Bob Bartlett, veteran Arctic navigator, who was one of the late Command-Peary's party when he made his istoric dash to the North Pole in

Captain Bartlett was in Halifax yeserday for a few hours en route to Washington, D.C., where he is now attached to the Navy Department. He had with him hundreds of valuable specimens which he collected last summer off the Labrador Coast, specimens which he will present to the Smithsonian Institute, to be used in that organization in its research work relative to the fishing industry in the North Atlantia

"It is useless to attempt to fly across the vast Arctic regions adjacent to the Pole, with only a few months' preparation and with small planes," said Captain Bartlett. "And personally I don't believe it is wise or reasonable to expend large sums for expeditions of this nature that hope to make the flight from such places as Etah. There is one place where these flights can be started, and that is off the Alaskan coast and in the Polar Basin."

No Electrical Storms. According to Captain Bartlett conitions in the Polar Basin are ideal for the use of aircraft.
