

HARPER'S PHRASE BOOK .- The author is W. Pembroke Fetridge; Clitton E. Tunis & Co; Guelph; T. J. Day. It is manual for the use of American travelers in Europe, containing selections of English words and phrases, with their corresponding terms in French, German and Italian, arranged in parallel columns. It also gives brief rules for the pronunciation of the different languages, with a series of exercises on the primary grammatical forms. The work has the advantage of presenting the common phrases of three nguages, in comparison with the English, instead of one, as is usually the case in handbooks of the kind, thus saving the trouble of carrying two volumes, an object of considerable importance to the traveller, where baggage has to pay by the pound. 
