SPANISH AFFAIRS.

We recur to this subject chiefly for the purpose of presenting to our readers in concise form the principal events which have occurred in Spain during the past week. And the most important circumstance to be noticed is the flight of the Queen from San Sebastian where she had remained from her interview with the Emperor Napoleon. to Bayonne on the frontiers of France. Thus the last of the Bourbons, as she called, has been hurled from the throne she disgraced, and has become throne she disgraced, and has become an exile like many others of her race. For nearly three centuries has the house of Bourbon given rulers to France, to Spain, or to some of the provinces of Italy, and during a certain period Bourbons reigned in all three countries at the same time, now all are fugitives and outcasts, brought to nought chiefly by the license they allowed to their own low passions. Charles X was chased from France in 1830, and with him ended the race of Bourbon rulers in that country. The years 1859 and 1860 witnessed the expulsion of those members of this noted family which then held sovereignty in the two Sicilies, and in Parmand Placenza, and in the course of one short, but vigorous and determined revolution, the dynasty has been overturned in Spain, where, with the exception of one brief interruption in the time of the first Napoleon who placed his brother Joseph on the throne, it has swayed the sceptre since the beginning of the eighteenth century. Added to the iniquity of their private deviations from virtue the Bourbons have always had a strong inclination to stretch their power towards fierce despotism, and though nations may suffer long it very frequently occurs that the people come to understand, or at least to believe for a time, that they are sovereign. French revolutions are proverbial for the rapidity with which they effect changes and accomplish their purpose, but none of them has far outstripped in celerity that which has driven Isabella from the throne. Her ministers and generals, her soldiers and sailors deserted her with scarcely a moment's hesitation, and indeed she seems to have been as much despised as our own Charles I, who in the first hours of adversity "found none to say seems to have been as much despised as our own Charles I, who in the first hours of adversity "found none to say "God bless him." All these events have crowded one after the other with a bewildering rapidity. It seems very prob-ble that Republicanism will be the form of government adopted in Spain, and that it will require the subtlety and shrewdness of a Louis Napoleon to restore either a kingdom or an empire. Isabella from beyond the Pyrenees has issued her protect that her rights are not injured by the force used by the Rebels, and the acts of a Junta established by violence are not binding on the people. The sword of her illustrious ancestor, Henry of Navarre, might be of semense to the exigency; as for her protest it will avail nothing whatever.


