Credit Valley Railway.
We extract the following from an article on this subject in the Elora Observer:
"Elora's share is something over \$8,000, and it becomes a grave question for the ratepayers who are asked to advance the Orangeville contribution is small, although its population is one-third more than that of Elora, and the very inadequate accommodation the T.G. & B. Railway affords that place has induced the people to cry out for railway competition. Elora is further from a railway than any of the municipalities interested, and we commend her desire for greater facilities for transport, but decidedly object to being taxed therefor. East Garafraxa adjoins Orangeville station, and has a railway running along her northern border; West Garafraxa has Arthur station at one point, Fergus at another, and the lower part of the township generally goes to Guelph. The lower part of Nichol is less than seven miles from Guelph, the centre has Elora and Fergus for markets, and the upper part in addition to Alma, has less than five miles to travel for either of the villages named. Pilkington is about equally well off with Nichol; and then we have the two villages of Fergus and Elora left. Fergus desires the Railway and is prepared to pay its price, as she has been offered the workshops for the line, which will amply repay her outlay. In the matter of competition in road freighting, wherever that may be, will be thrown in. Then Elora is promised the terminus of the road as her share of the advantages to accrue, and as compensation for what she is called on to pay—an advantage which will likely be deprived of to no great extent, as the same parties who propose to carry the road from Orangeville here, and are scheming to catch all the small towns and villages west of Toronto to St. Thomas, will plan for an extension of the road onwards before it even opens to Elora. Fergus is to have its bond for work done, when should not Elora have its bond for the terminus, with a refund on the extension of the line?"
But even with such a stipulation we seriously doubt the policy of giving our proportion for the money asked, for the advantages proposed to be conferred. Elora manufactures all the barley and wheat that are brought to her market, besides receiving large quantities by rail. Guelph, only 13 miles south, is a better average grain market than Toronto, and the distance to Toronto via our own road and the Grand Trunk, is some dozen miles less than the proposed route by the Credit Valley line. Where then are the advantages to be given Elora for her twenty years taxation?"

THE PACIFIC RAILROAD.—It is reported at Ottawa, that at a meeting of the Pacific Railway Directors on Friday last, Sir Hugh Allan submitted to his co-directors an offer from a well known promoter in England to form a syndicate for the purpose of attempting to float the scheme, if the Government and Legislature assent to the following conditions:—The time for completing the work to be extended from eight to twelve years; authority to be given to issue the bonds at 85 per cent. net; and to increase the issue from \$40,000 per mile, as now limited by Act of Parliament, to \$50,000 per mile; and certain modifications to be in the term in which the payments of the cash subsidy of \$30,000,000 are provided for by the Act.
