The New Act Respecting Weights and Measures.

As some grain dealers are in doubt respecting the use of the "Cental," as provided in Section 5 of the Act xxxvi., Vic. Cap. 47, which came into force on the first instant, and are desirous of knowing whether there is any penalty for making contracts and delivering grain by the bushel, and whether subsection 2, of the Section above referred to, legalizes special contracts made by the bushel, we may inform our readers that upon enquiry at the Inland Revenue office here, we find the construction put jupon the law is:

1. That although no special penalty is provided for making contracts, or delivering articles by the bushel, still such contracts would be illegal and could not be enforced.

2. That a bushel of wheat, even if executed the upon the contracts.

2. That a bushel of wheat, even if specially mentioned in an agreement under sub-section 2, would not mean sixty (60) pounds as heretofore, but only a bushel of capacity, that is to say, 2150.42 cubic inches, and so of all the other articles mentioned in the section above referred to.
