It will be remembered that in the Government scheme for the settle ment of the Municipal Loan Fund debt, Guelph was classed among those Municipalities which are still indebted to the/Fund after receiving credit for the several allowances provided in the resolutions, and whose debts are not reduced by either the 5 cent rule or the 2 cent rule. Following this rule, the Government in the first schedule returned Guelph as indebted in the sum of \$53,221.62. In the re-vised schedule, just issued, we find that this amount is reduced to \$49.-660.81, being \$2,561 less than the sum first charged against the corpo-ration. The reason for this reduction is that the town is entitled to interest on four-sevenths of its railway allow-ance, for a longer period than that for which it had been allowed in preparing the first schedules, namely from December, 1853, instead of 1855. It was also found that the town is entitled to a larger allowance in respect of Clergy Reserve moneys retained by the Government during the time the instalments on the Municipal Loan Fund devt, according to the 5 cent arrangement, were left unpaid.

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


