Before they departed they comforted the household of Lydia and the brethren, who had no doubt been much in prayer for them (chapter xvi, 40). He would no doubt comfort them, as he did in his letter to them, by the as-surance that all that had happened had fallen out rather unto the further ance of the gospel, and as his great desire was "by all means to save some" he could and did rejoice in spite of all his sufferings and shameful Mounted Grindtreatment (Phil. i, 12, 18; I Cor. ix. 22). 
