### A CANNERS' COMBINATION

Consolidation of Several Ontario Factories.

A big consolidation of a number of the canning factories of the Province is announced under the name of the Canadian Canners' Consolidated Companies, Limited, which has just received incorporation. The authorized capital of this latest syndicate is \$2,500,000, and the head office of the company will be in Hamilton. The company will not only do a general canning business, but is also authorized to take over existing firms. Those at present associated with the new concern are Messrs. Hugh Macdonald of Chatham, Samuel Nesbitt of Brighton, David Marshall of Aylmer, W. H. Whittside and W. Ferguson of Delhi, Russell Bowly of Waterford, T. N. Dunn of Strathroy, Wellington Boulter and A. W. Hepburn of Picton, F. R. Lalor of Dunnville, W. P. Innes of Simcoe, and H. I. Mathews of Lakeport.

### COUP BY FILIPINOS.

Town Captured and Several Police Slain.

Manila, March 24.—The Town of Surigao, in the northeastern part of the Island of Mindanao, was captured yesterday by Filipino insurgents, who killed Constabulary Inspector Clarke and several others. A detachment of 30 men belonging to the 10th Infantry, under the command of Lieutenants Patterson and Brown, is hurrying from Iliagan, on the northwest coast of Mindanao, to Surigao, in the transport Reilly with orders to recapture the town.

Brigadier-Gen. Sumner, commanding the department of Mindanao, has been ordered to send two additional companies of troops to Surigao. It is reported that the Filipinos are holding the town, but details of the fight have not been received. The fate of the white officials and other foreigners is not known. If they have been captured vigorous measures will be taken to rescue them. This is the first time American troops have been used since peace with the Moros was declared.

## COUNTY NEWS.

The M. C. R. have put in an electric bell at the crossing at Main street, West Lorne.

Geo. Potticary, of Middlemarch, has sold his 100-acre farm to Mr. Carroll for \$7,200.

The citizens of St. Thomas, by a vote of 678 to 48, favored the purchase of Pinafore Park.

P. J. Lindenman has sold his 90-acre farm on Silver street, Aldborough, to Harry Smailes for \$2,000.

Rev. W. Hartley, St. Thomas, has received a unanimous call to the Baptist church in Youkers, N.Y.

Lord Dundonald, commander in chief of the Canadian forces, will be in St. Thomas for one hour on Monday.

The Aylmer hockey team played nine games, winning 8. Simcoe was the only team that vanquished them.

Andrew Carnegie has offered \$25,000 to erect a free public library in St. Thomas, providing the council agrees to maintain it at a cost of \$2,500 a year.

Father Bayard, of St. Thomas, has been forty-four years a priest, and his congregation celebrated the event with appropriate ceremonies and felicitations.

At the Baptist parsonage, St. Thomas, Howard Ditts and Miss Maud E. Shriner, residents of the city, were united in marriage by Rev. W. Hartley.

A quiet event took place on Wednesday afternoon, when Miss Lillian, second daughter of Mrs. Lachlin Paterson, Back street, became the wife of A. Gooden, one of Aldborough's prosperous young farmers. Rev. J. F. Scott, of Rodney, officiated.

The arbitrators in the case of Mrs. and Misses Humphries, of Southwell, against the L. E. & D. R. R. to determine the value of the land taken by the railway, are Judge Hughes for the ladies, Judge Horns for the railway company, and Judge Finkle, of Woodstock, as the third. They will meet in St. Thomas on May 4.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Leslie, who live north of West Lorne, were pleasantly surprised by about one hundred of their friends lately, and presented with two handsome chairs. Mr. and Mrs. Leslie have lived on the seventh concession of Aldborough for the past thirty years, and although not moving far away, their neighbors and friends took the privilege of showing their esteem for them.

Deep and general regret was felt at Sheldon on Saturday when it was learned that one of its most prominent young men had passed away in the person of James Moore, eldest son of Nelson Moore. The deceased was only twenty-three years of age and was ill but a few days. He was an enthusiastic Odd-Fellow, being Past Grand of Sheldon Lodge. His parents survive him, as well as one brother. The funeral took place on Tuesday at the Sheldon cemetery and was largely attended.

The service was held in the Methodist church, and at the grave the service was conducted by the Odd-Fellows.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that an application will be made to the Parliament of Canada, at its next session, for an Act to incorporate a company under the name of "The St. Joseph Transportation Company," with power to locate and construct a canal or system of canals so as to create a navigable waterway from some point on the eastern shore of Lake Huron, in the County of Lambton, in the Province of Ontario, to some point on the northern shore of Lake Erie in the County of Egan, in the said Province of Ontario, to make surveys and to determine the location of the said waterway; to dredge, deepen, raise or lower the levels of, or improve existing water-courses between the said points, and to establish such connecting links necessary to make and complete through and navigable waterway from the said points, and to fix the distance between the said terminal points a navigable canal of a depth of not less than eighteen feet, and of a width which may be found necessary to enable vessels; of deep draught to meet and pass in safety at any point in said canal; moreover, to construct, operate and maintain all such works and structures necessary in connection with such waterway; moreover, to acquire, build, own, lease, operate and maintain or otherwise dispose of terminals, harbors, wharves, docks, piers, landing places, water lots, yards, elevators, warehouses, dry docks, reservoirs and other structures, such as locks, dams and all works necessary for the production and use of electric, hydraulic, pneumatic and other power, and for the said undertaking, and also for the purpose of irrigation; to lease or otherwise dispose of said works and powers; to acquire, own, lease, transport by cable or electric power, all steamers, barges, or any other vessels which require to be transported through the said waterway for the purpose of inland navigation, and also with power to acquire, own, sell and dispose of vessels of all kinds, and to transport them through the said canal, in such manner and upon such terms as the company may deem fit; with power also to acquire by purchase, expropriation or otherwise, such lands, water lots, rights, or navigable or unnavigable streams and rivers, and other such property as may be necessary for the purpose of the undertaking, and to again dispose thereof, or any part thereof, as the company may deem expedient; to levy and collect tolls; to take, use and dispose of water for the purpose of said canal or for irrigation purposes, or for generating hydraulic or other powers; to transmit and dispose of the said powers for all purposes; with power also to construct and operate a line of railway and tramway of either standard or narrow gauge; also such bridges, ferries, telegraph, telephone or electric light or power lines, which may be considered necessary in connection with the said undertaking; to own, acquire, control and operate branch lines of railway to connect with all and any railways situated within a distance of ten miles from any portion of the said canal, and to connect with such other railway or railways and enter into running or traffic arrangements therewith; also to acquire and run said branch lines of railway, either by steam or electric or cable or pneumatic power; to make arrangements with any company, corporation, person or persons, whosoever to carry passengers, freight or other commodity over and through the works of the company, and to charge such prices and tolls therefor as may be approved; moreover with power to purchase or otherwise acquire shares, debentures and securities of other canal or railway companies and corporations, and to sell or exchange its own securities with such other powers and privileges, including financing, as may be necessary for the purposes hereinafore stated; together with all such general powers and privileges, including financing, as may be necessary for the purposes hereinafore stated.

### Dosing a Fowl.

Pills are a convenient form, and for poultry they never need be larger than four or five grains; but better than these pills are gelatine capsules, which my own poultry will pick up off the ground. If I want to give one of my own fowls a dose of medicine, I have only to take it into a corner by itself and throw down a raspberry-colored capsule, and the bird will pick it up of its own accord and swallow it whole. This is in reality far better than having to get a fowl and force a pill down its throat, and I want to emphasize the importance of treating a sick fowl as you would treat a sick child; do not make it worse by having a struggle every time a dose of medicine is necessary. Failing a capsule, a small pill will generally be taken without difficulty by a fowl if it is placed in the middle of a little piece of moist bread.

There is another point. Most people seem to have very crude ideas as to what constitutes a "dose" for a fowl. I come across people sometimes who think nothing of giving a large pinch of cayenne pepper to a fowl. I have known as much as a quarter of a teaspoonful to be given to one unfortunate bird. When the farmer is tempted to give cayenne pepper to his birds, let him remember that one grain of cayenne pepper makes eight doses for a full-grown fowl. The use of cayenne pepper is as an occasional—very occasional—internal irritant, the object of which is to act slightly upon the liver or to excite the digestive organs and make them a little more sensitive than usual. The folly of overdosing must be one which causes more suffering to poultry than to any other members of the animal kingdom. I can give another instance. I hear of people giving a tablespoonful of cod-liver oil to a fowl, and I always tell them that if they would give a full-grown fowl fifteen drops (that is to say, just exactly one-sixteenth of a tablespoonful) three times a day it would do a great deal more good; for the system of a fowl can only assimilate a small quantity of the chlorides and the bromides and the phosphates and the iodides in cod-liver oil, and what is given beyond that is waste, or worse than waste, for it tends to cause hypertrophy of the liver. Small doses of medicine given frequently and regularly are infinitely better than big doses given unsystematically and spasmodically.—W. M. Freeman, in American Cultivator.
