I'll bet you anything you say that I can get what I want at this place and get it cheaper than anywhere else, or at any flower place that keeps its name out of the newspapers. The business man that doesn't advertise almost invariably cheated me, on the theory, I presume, that I'd come there anyhow-or that his reputation brought me there. But I always found such a man narrow-minded, selfish, non-enterprising, penny-wise and pound-foolish, even if he didn't cheat me outright. No, sir; I never
