Hon. David Mills' Opinion of His Mission.

Thinks It Can Only be an Ecclesiastical One

The School Question Is Settled and Cannot be Changed.

Mgr. Merry Del Val Can Only Settle Differences Between Sections of the Church-The Government Can Take No Official Cognizance of the Pope-Education Purely a State Matter.

Hon. David Mills left for Ottawa today, to be present at the opening of Parliament. Before going he was seen by an Advertiser reporter, and asked for his opinion of Mgr. Merry del Val's "I don't know precisely under what

circumstances the Pope's delegate to Canada is visiting this country, or the exact nature of his mission," said Mr. Mills. "If it is for the purpose of settling the question of controversy between two sections of the Roman Catholic Church, or between prominent laymen of the church and the hierspectfully requested to use their best efforts to negotiate and perfect such archy, I see no objection. It is in that regard a controversy between two sectreaty, and that a committee of this Council be appointed to prepare the tions of the same religious body, and it address, consisting of the Honorable the Attorney-General, the Colonial Secretary, the Hon. "It would seem." the reporter suggested, "that from the statement Mgr. Merry del Val, that he regards his mission as not purely an ecclesiastical one, but as one of controversy beween the Government of Canada and the church.'

'If he is under any such apprehension," continued Mr. Mills, "he is cer-tainly mistaken, because that view would be based upon the assumption that the three millions of Protestants of this country either have nothing to say upon the subject of education, question of State jurisdiction, or that would have the right to prone authoritatively for them, as well as for the members of his own church That certainly he cannot do. The Protestant population of this country re eognize the supremacy of the crown in matters of government. The con-stitution of this country assumes that the legislature of each province has the right to deal with the subject of education; that it is a subject affecting the well being of the State; that under our parliamentary system we cannot afford to leave it to voluntary enterprise because it is to the higher interest of the State that the entire population, into whose hands the busi ness of government is practically placed, shall be qualified to perform he functions with which they are in trusted. 
