

CASTRO CAPTURES CIUDAD BOLIVAR

Has Revolutionists Hemmed
In on All Sides.

THEY MUST SURRENDER OR DIE

Sanguinary Conflicts in the Streets
of the City—Many Hundreds
Are Killed.

Soledad, Venezuela, July 20. — Since the last dispatch was sent to the Associated Press at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the battle between the revolutionary forces at Ciudad Bolivar and the Venezuelan Government army, commanded by Gen. Gomez, has raged madly. As fast as barricaded houses were abandoned by the revolutionists the Government troops would occupy them.

In the evening the Government forces, which were advancing from all directions, arrived near the center of Ciudad Bolivar. Firing was renewed with more vigor at 10 o'clock at night and illuminated the sky. At 3 o'clock in the morning the Government forces of the commercial and foreign parts of the city abandoned their homes and sought refuge in other parts of the city, amidst a hail of bullets and shells. Many men in trying to protect the women fell, struck by bullets, in the middle of the streets.

At 8 o'clock this morning the Government generals decided to push the attack on the center of their city. Behind a barricade in the public park was found more than 30 dead soldiers lying on top of each other, while wounded men were seen on all sides. At 10 o'clock the Government commanders ordered twelve guns to open fire on the Alameda, and at the same time the Venezuelan fleet opened fire. The soldiers on both sides have had no food for two days, no ambulances are used, and yet the fighting continues.

At 4 p.m. Monday the advance of the Government troops reached the market place. The old custom house and waterworks were in the hands of the Dalton Block, the property of the United States consul, where all the leading German and French firms reside, was then being attacked.

All the defeated revolutionists have concentrated at the jail, where the fighting continues. It is estimated that more than 200 men have been killed in that vicinity.

The artillery of the revolutionists is fiercely replying to the attack of the fleet. The fleet shelled La Soledad, which has suffered terribly. The capital is still in possession of the revolutionists, but the complete success of the Government forces is assured.

A messenger who has arrived at Caracas by steamer and train from Ciudad Bolivar reports that the city was captured by the Government troops at 8 o'clock this morning.

The fight between the Government forces and revolutionists from 1 o'clock this afternoon has been horrible, and at this hour the only places which still resist the onset of the Government troops are the jail and the capitol.

Early in the afternoon the Government troops, numbering 5,000 men, were ordered to make a general attack upon all positions still held by the rebels. At 5 o'clock this afternoon the Zamora, called the Sebastopol of Ciudad Bolivar, was stormed and captured. Ninety-four dead rebels were found inside, among them being Gen. Azanza, one of the revolutionary leaders, whose head had been blown off by a shell. It is impossible to give an idea of the carnage which occurred at this point. At the same time Gen. Rivas, Gen. Gomez's chief lieutenant, with 2,300 men, succeeded in destroying a barricade erected around the

Miranda Plaza, the key to the capitol, where all the survivors of the revolution were concentrated. All the roads and streets running into the capitol are guarded by Government troops and the escape of the revolutionists after the capture of the capitol, which is inevitable, seems impossible. They must either surrender or die. At 7 o'clock tonight the custom house was taken after a ten-hour fight. A press representative counted 60 killed as a result of this fight. The Dalton Block, where the American consulate and most of the foreign business houses are located, was captured at 5 o'clock. The revolutionists are without provisions and water, the supply pipe having been cut yesterday. Their situation is considered desperate and hopeless. The shops are being pillaged.

A TORONTO SUICIDE

Grief Causes John Logie to Take
Paris Green.

Toronto, July 22. — John Logie, a marine engineer who came here from Scotland in May last, committed suicide in East Toronto yesterday by taking poison. He was sent to his brother, James, at Eglinton, and worked in Polson's shipyard. He turned up at three o'clock yesterday afternoon at the residence of a Mr. Johnson, of East Toronto, and said he had taken Paris green. He was sent to a general hospital, and died at eight o'clock last night. Grief over the death of his wife and children caused the act.

WHEN WILL IT END?

Philippines in Warm Fight With the
U. S. Troops.

Manila, July 22. — The Philippine scouts and rural constabulary defeated 250 rebels in the streets of Albay, the capital of the Island of Albay, Thursday, killing 15 and wounding 15. The combatants entered the town from opposite sides, and street fighting continued for three hours. Four non-combatants were killed. The scouts lost one killed and two wounded. The rebels were led by Simeon Ola, chief of the Albay rebels, and they had 30 rifles. Col. H. H. Banholtz, who was in command of the scouts, and constabulary, has been campaigning actively in Albay, but this was his first decisive engagement.

C. P. R. Earnings.

Montreal, July 22. — Sir Thomas Shaughnessy yesterday told the Telegram correspondent that earnings of C. P. R. for the month of June would exceed that of any railway on the continent. The increase was \$200,000 over the corresponding month of last year, and that of the New York Central for the same month.

The Largest Pearl.

St. Paul, July 22. — A special from Walpole, N. H., says the largest fresh water pearl on record was found at Genoa. It weighs 185 grains and is pure white. It measures fifteen-sixteenths of an inch in diameter.

A local dealer bought the pearl, just as it was when it came from the shell, for \$2,750.

Struck by Fast Train.

Watford, July 22. — David Morgan, a well-known Watford farmer, residing on the second line, N. E. R., was returning home from Watford Monday evening, and in driving across the G. T. R. crossing at the town line, five miles east of Watford, his horse was struck by the Pacific express going west, and instantly killed. Morgan was thrown out, but escaped uninjured.

Didn't Want Police.

Dublin, July 22. — It is understood that when arrangements were being made for the Irish tour King Edward resolutely refused to sanction the proposal for a Scotland Yard to send a number of detectives. "I want no such protection," said the King. "All the protection I want, I shall receive from the Irish people. On that point I am perfectly satisfied."

Back to Scotland.

Montreal, July 22. — A committee of ten, representing the Scotch iron molders, who were brought to this country to work for the Canada Foundry Company at Toronto, is in the city, making arrangements to have the whole party of 150 men taken back to the old country. They claim that they were brought to Canada under misrepresentation.

A Tuberculosis Hospital.

Montreal, July 22. — The civic authorities are to be asked to fund a hospital in the city or near it for the treatment of tuberculosis. The move comes from the provincial board of health and a number of leading physicians interested in combating the disease.

A BAD BATTLE IS THREATENED

United States Troops and Wyoming
Cattle Men Are Likely
to Clash.

Cheyenne, Wyo., July 22. — A battle between troops and armed cattlemen is believed to be imminent in the Big Horn county, Sheriff Fenton and deputies left Thermopolis for Basin at 8 o'clock yesterday morning with his prisoner, Jim McCloud, charged with the murder of Ben Minnick, a flock master. The party is escorted by the Basin light battery of 40 men under Capt. Prince.

It is reported that a large force of cattlemen have fixed an ambush on Cottonwood Creek, 25 miles from Thermopolis, and will endeavor to deliver McCloud and assist him out of the country. The State troops at Lander, Buffalo, Sheridan and other nearby points have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to take the field at a moment's notice.

DRUGGED AND KIDNAPPED

The Strange Tale Told by a Young
Detroit Girl.

Cleveland, O., July 22. — A strange case of kidnapping came to light yesterday. Mrs. Gertrude Wheeler, of Cleveland, came to Chief Kohler's office and inquired about her daughter, Ella, who mysteriously disappeared two months ago from Detroit. Inquiry was made, and it was learned that a girl corresponding to the description given by Mrs. Wheeler was staying at the rescue home of the Salvation Army. An officer accompanied the woman to the home and found the missing girl.

The girl told a strange tale. She was kidnapped from Detroit, she says, and had been drugged. She found herself in Cleveland, not knowing where she was or how she had come here. After wandering around town for some time and suffering many privations, she was directed to the Salvation Army by a girl in a pretty, 17 years old. The Detroit police will be furnished particulars, and an effort made to locate the man responsible for her misfortune.

INSANE AND DRUNK

A Wild Telephone Message That
Proved a Canard.

Fall River, Mass., July 22. — A telephone message from W. K. Hathaway, who resides in a lonely section on the outskirts of the city, was received at the police station here at 2 o'clock this morning stating that Mrs. Reid, an aged woman, who lived alone in an adjoining house, had been murdered, and that two men who had committed the crime were still in the house, which was guarded by five men. Mr. Hathaway asked that assistance be sent immediately, and a patrol wagon with a dozen officers was hurried to the scene.

When the officers arrived at the house they found Henry Smith, 47, the old country, who had been released from the Taunton Insane Asylum, and who had been stopping at the Reid house, asleep on the piazza, while Mrs. Reid was found locked in her room suffering from several cuts and bruises. Smith was very much intoxicated. He said, it is said, was somewhat under the influence of liquor. Both were taken to the station house in the patrol wagon and locked up.

SICKROOM FOR SHOPPERS

New York's Big Stores Take Care of
Patients.

New York, July 22. — A sickroom for the convenience of shoppers has become a feature in every well organized department store in New York, although the managers do not advertise the fact, for obvious reasons.

Should a clerk discover that a customer is ill she at once notifies the aisle man, who, if the customer is too ill to walk, rings an emergency gong. An attendant immediately starts with a rolling chair for the scene of trouble, with the patient aboard, it is rolled into an elevator and hurried to the sickroom. The colored maid in attendance is supplied with a number of simple remedies, the use of which she understands, for her aid to relieve she gives the case into the care of a trained nurse employed for that purpose. If dangerous symptoms are manifest the nurse summons the store physician, who, if not on duty in the store, can be summoned by telephone. The patient can remain where she is until restored, or if she desires is carefully placed in a cab and removed to her home.

It has been noticed that there are always more patients on bargain days, doubtless resulting from the crush and excitement which all women are not fitted to encounter. It is a discouraging fact that in few instances do the persons ministered to in this manner at the expense of the firm ever return to express thanks or to offer remuneration.

An employee's sickroom is part of the establishment in all department stores. During rush hours, especially, fainting fits are common among the girls, and often if given good care and half an hour's rest, they are able to relieve their duties, when otherwise they would be incapacitated for the day. Such a room is always equipped with comfortable lounges, complements of medicines, all in charge of a matron.

\$100,000 Horse Burned.

Lexington, Ky., July 22. — Imp. Mirth, John D. Madden's \$100,000 thoroughbred stallion, was burned to death in his stable at Hamburg Place early today. The barn was destroyed. The loss will reach \$200,000.

Poisoned 1,000 Sheep.

Billings, Mont., July 22. — Word comes from Columbus of a heavy loss sustained by the late named Grimes. Poison was scattered on the range where Grimes' sheep were herded. Over 1,000 sheep are known to have died. Another shepherd is said to have lost over 300 head.

CREW DRIVEN MAD BY FUSEL OIL

They Sing, Dance, Laugh, Cry
and Fight Each Other and the
Police—Now in Hospital.

New York, July 22. — Crazed by the fumes of fusel oil, which permeated the hold on the steamer Toronto of the Wilson Line from Hull, half a dozen sailors and longshoremen, who were unloading her cargo, fought each other and their would-be rescuers, the police and ambulance surgeons, and tried to jump overboard at pier 50, North River last night. After an hour's struggle, six men were taken to a hospital in ambulances. Twenty men were working in the hold when two casks of fusel oil being hoisted to the main deck fell and burst. Soon the fumes began to affect the sailors and longshoremen, and they all hurried to the deck. Captain Whitten called the volunteers to go down into the hold and take up the oil. Six men volunteered. Samuel Miller, Thomas Ray, William Leax, John McLeod, William Hakes and Thomas Patterson.

Miller and Ray soon toppled over. They were brought up on deck and revived. Miller and Ray had been to be seized by Miller and he had to be held, while Ray wanted to jump overboard. Dr. McDonald said the men had been affected by the fumes that they might as well be classed as victims of delirium tremens. The others sang, danced, laughed, cried and fought, together making such a racket that a great crowd began to gather. The police had to disperse it.

A WORLD'S FAIR FIGHT

Ironworkers Resent Employment of
Non-Union Men.

St. Louis, July 22. — Upon orders of walking delegates, about 150 men, structural iron workers and roofers on the machinery building at the World's Fair grounds, are on strike, their claims being that workmen building the elevated track are not union men. Then-union men continued to work when the strike was ordered, and a fight ensued, resulting in the non-union men fleeing for safety. Several men were hurt, Joseph Myers' skull being fractured. Police restored quiet and the strikers were forced to leave the building. No arrests were made.

WHISTLER BURIED

Many Distinguished Persons Attend
Funeral of Dead Artist.

London, July 22. — The body of James McNeill Whistler, the American artist, who died July 17, was interred this morning in the family burial plot in the old church at Chiswick. The funeral services were held at Chelsea, in the old church where he often went with his mother when she was alive. There were no services at the house. The coffin, which was covered with a purple pall, was carried to the church, followed by the honorary pallbearers and relatives. The funeral was presided over by Sir James Guthrie, president of the Royal Scottish Academy. Charles Freer, George Washington Edwards, Edwin A. Abbey, John Lavery, of the Royal Scottish Academy and Theodore Duret.

ABANDONED FOR A YEAR

The Blue Nile Expedition a Chapter of
Accidents.

Aden, Arabia, July 22. — Details of the failure of the Blue Nile expedition, headed by W. N. MacMillan, of St. Louis, Mo., show that it started down the river in iron rafts, and that while passing the rapids between precipitous cliffs, punctuated by five men, the occupants swam ashore and camped. A hurricane swept the gorge the following day and further damaged the expedition, which returned by forced marches and abandoned its task for one year. Mr. MacMillan expects ultimate success.
