Sin in the polished, in the refined, in the intellectual, sin in those who can evade the law is just so offensive in the sight of the Lord as the other."

SIN TRAVELS EVERYWHERE.
"The heart is deceitful above all things. Sin is as deep as hell. Scripture does not paint the picture in the text too darkly. There is no extravagance. All have gone astray, each in his own way—the highly educated, the refined as well as the uncultured. Sin has traveled everywhere. It has permeated the whole mass of humanity. It has stained, corrupted and alienated men from God. There are none righteous."

TELEPHONE COMPANY'S RIGHTS ON THE STREETS

Important Decision by Judge Meredith—Fort William vs. The Bell Telephone Company.

The interim injunction issued on the 12th of February, restraining the Bell Telephone Company from erecting any further poles or stringing wires for telephone purposes in the town of Fort William, came up for hearing before Judge Meredith at St. Thomas on Friday, 19th. Mr. Holman, acting for the town of Fort William, asked to have the case enlarged for two weeks to enable him to produce evidence in support of his affidavits in the case.

Esq., K. C., for the Bell Telephone Company, asked to have the injunction dissolved so far as the stringing of wires is concerned, stating that the company had no present intention of erecting any further poles on the streets of the town. The judge amended the injunction so that it prohibited only the erection of new poles, allowing the company to proceed with stringing wires on existing poles until the case comes to trial.

QUESTION OF POWER WILL BE A VERY IMPORTANT ONE

Will Engage Much Attention at Coming Parliament.

Mr. Dan McGillicuddy Speaks of Radial Railways.

"With electrical development proceeding at the rate it is, it will be a very short time before this western part of Ontario will be gridironed with radial railways," was the expression of Mr. Dan McGillicuddy in a conversation on Saturday evening with an Advertiser reporter, who had recognized the familiar face of the Goderich politician and editor of the Signal, at that place. Mr. McGillicuddy was stopping at the Grigg House for a short time on his way to the Provincial capital, and when seen was asked as to what he thought would be the most important things dealt with at the coming session of the Legislature.

The matter that would engage the most attention, he said, would be that of electrical power. Of course it would be hard to tell just what would be done in this matter or what should be done, as it was a great question as to what power was available at the Niagara River and as to the cost of power. These matters would be factors in the question whether the western towns could make use of it. The Government were wise in appointing the commission to look into these matters and report and there was no doubt that there would be important legislation passed at the coming session.

RECOGNIZE VALUE OF POWER.
"You see," said Mr. McGillicuddy, "this problem has arisen as it has not before. We have got to that point where the people of the Province are recognizing the value of electrical development, and soon every available place of power will be put to use, and the enterprises will mean a great advantage for this part of the Province. The question of power is directly connected with that of radial railways, for the importance of these roads to the country is beginning to dawn on the people, and as soon as they see fully their value they will do all they can to encourage them."

"I see that London is interested in having new roads come to this city, and it is to be hoped that the city will soon be entered by a number of these radial roads, for they will all bring business and stimulate it. I am a provincial director in a company that is applying to the Legislature this session for permission to extend their line into the city of London if desired, and that is what will be wanted as soon as the road has reached the boundaries of the County of Middlesex. Last year we were granted our charter. At that time we applied for a charter for a radial road to be known as the Huron, Bruce and Middlesex, to run out of Goderich and down through to London. Strenuous opposition was put up against this at the time by the gentlemen who then represented the city and surrounding county, the claim being that it would be inimical to the county's interests. However, the more roads there could be the better, and this was pointed out, but the opposition was strong enough in the railway committee to make us change our plans. Another reason put up against us was that too much mileage was asked. The committee therefore granted us the right to come down to the southernmost boundary of the County of Huron, also giving us a charter to extend the line north into the County of Grey, thus tapping Owen Sound and that district. The road was therefore called the Huron, Bruce and Grey."

"The initials, 'H. B. and G.' might be confused with the 'H. G. and B.' the Hamilton, Grimsby and Beamsville road, and this is one reason we have since decided that the name should be changed. At the same time we are going to make an effort to be granted permission to extend our line and we think that this session the railway committee will see that it is in the best interests of London, as well as the country through which the line passes, that the extra mileage should be allowed.
