New York, Nov. 21—Close.—Renewed weakness in the Steel securities was principal influence in today's mark Activity centered in the preferred, t declines in which took place not so mu on account of heavy liquidation as be-cause of the lack of support, but un-doubtedly uneasiness is being created among holders of Steel securities by the reports that are now being published in the New York papers to the effect that there is a probability of the dividend or the preferred stock being reduced at the next meeting of the board. The consensus of opinion is, however, that the story emanates from speculative quarters, and is not worthy of belief. In Southern Pacific, which was notably strong yesterday, there was a cessation of the bullish manipulation, and it was thought that liquidation on the part of the pool had been detected. The showing made by the bank statement was not in line with yesterday's estimates. The loss in cash of over \$3,500,000 caused surprise, and was supposed to be caused by shipments to the interior at the end of last week, which were not reflected in last week's statement. It had been hoped that the decrease in loans would be at least \$4,000,000, but the actual figures fell \$1,400. 000 below this amount. The surplus reserve now stands slightly below \$4,000.000. and is unusually small for this time of the year. Last year it was nearly \$20.before the close, owing to the amounce-ment that \$3,000,000 had been received today from Europe, making total importations since the beginning of the move-ment a little over \$6,000,000. It is estimated that there is still about \$2,000,000 on the way to this country. The loan market showed a fair demand for Steel,


