

IMPRESSIONS OF OLD MEXICO

Mr. W. D. Love Spraks of His Sojourn in the Land of Coricz.

Mr. W. D. Love, son of Police Magistrate Love, of this city, having just returned from a seven years' sojourn n Mexico, was interrogated by an Advertiser reporter this morning con-erning Mexico and her future.

"Mexico," said Mr. Love, "is un-loubtedly a great country and is developing very, very rapidly. In tropi-cal agriculture she is almost without a peer, her coffee, cotton and tobaccogrowing industries being very large. Mexican tobacco is, in my opinion, fully as good as that Havana, though t has not as wide a reputation. She nas also a large export trade in hides. "The great improvement in railway communication is developing the mining and smelting industries very rapdly and they are, without doubt, the biggest and most prosperous industries

n the country.' "With the opening of so many mines in Mexico, the condition of the people has greatly improved. They are arning and spending more money, and

are becoming better educated. "This last is greatly due to the efforts of President Diaz, who has improved the school system marvelously. Thirty years ago very few peons could ead or write and now a commonchool education is within the reach

"Much, indeed, of Mexico's prosperty in every line is due to President Diaz.
