Absorption of C. A. R. by Grand Trunk-Northwest Telephone Company.

Ottawa, March 3.-What appeared to Mrs. Pepper was roundly applauded be an innocent pair of bills, authorizing the absorption of the Canada Atlantic Railway by the Grand Trunk, developed a good deal of criticism and opposition in the railway committee of the House of Commons. Representaives of bondholders of two small branches, and of the city of Ottawa, presented amendments requiring the new owners to live up to certain obligations of the old company. Ottawa calls for a station for which the city paid \$50,000 in subsidies eight years ago. For the railway it was stated that a station, built at a cost of \$15,-000, had been accepted by the city as satisfactory. The bill finally stood until March 16. The Northwest Telephone Company's bill was reported, with important amendments.

The bill incorporating the Northwest Telephone Company was taken up at the opening of committee. An important amendment was accepted, submitted by the chairman as redrawn, providing that the company shall not amalgamate with or pool their earnings with other companies possessing similar powers. A lengthy discussion ensued on an amendment by Mr. W. F. Maclean compelling the company interchange of traffic by switchboard with any other company desiring it. Mr. Turriff, who introduced the bill, while professing sympathy with the object of the bill, objected to the one company being singled out for such a provision. believed they could safely wait for a general law from the Government.
