LOCAL MARKET.

London, Thursday, April 29.
The rain this morning interfered with business at the market. The attendance was about one-half as large as was expected. Small stuff formed the bulk of the offerings. Sales were brisk at prices that were about the same as paid at Tuesday's market. Saturday's market should be a hummer, partly owing to the small markets on Tuesday and today, and from the fact that the Easter market is considered to be one of the best held during the year.

Grain—Oats were the only kind of grain offered. There were about 15 loads offered. The demand was good at \$1.27 to \$1.29 per cwt. Only a couple of loads sold at the last-named figures.

Hay and straw—Ten loads of hay were offered. Sales were brisk at \$8 and \$5.50 per ton and one choice load sold at \$9 per ton. An Friday will be observed as a holiday and there is a lay-off against bringing in hay on Saturday unless previously arranged for. Monday's market. No straw was offered today.

Butter and Eggs—Roll butter was the chief supply. Prices were brisk at 23c, wholesale, and 24c to 25c, retail. Eggs sold well at 13c per dozen, wholesale; supply was small.

Potatoes—Several large loads offered, and a few small lots; sales were a trifle brisker, at 75c to 80c per bag. The hucksters were sold out of early stuff by 10 o'clock. Prices were as quoted.

Apples—The quantity offered was small, no change in prices.

Dressed Hogs—About 40 carcasses offered; sales brisk, at \$5.50 per cwt, where one was purchased \$7.75 per cwt, was obtained.

Poultry—Very little offered by the farmers; most of the offerings were sold by the hucksters; prices, so far as could be learned, were about the same as on Saturday.

Butchers' Meat—The supply was small. The advance in prices of cattle leaves little margin for the butchers, consequently, they are not rushing things until the market is in a more settled condition. Beef sold at \$6.50 to \$7.50 per cwt, the latter price for choice stuff. Veal, \$8 to \$7, for fair to good, and \$5 per cwt, for inferior. Lambs, yearlings, 11c to 12c per pound; spring lambs, \$5 to \$5.50 each; mutton, \$4 to \$5 per pound.

Maple Syrup—A couple of cans sold at \$1.20 and \$1.25 per gallon.
