SMITH VS. THE CITY OF LONDON.

Mr. Justice Riddell expressed a wish that the case of Smith vs. the Corporation of the City of London would be carried to the highest court of the Empire, and it is intimated by counsel for the plaintiff that this will be done. An important constitutional principle is involved—the right of a legislature in a British colony to over-ride, if it so desires, the civil rights of British subjects, or natural subjects between man and man. Justice Riddell has already declared in the Cobalt Lake case that the Ontario Legislature has power to abrogate the eighth commandment. Mr. Johnston, in his argument in the present case, maintained that the city of London, in carrying out the Niagara power contract, would be entering into private business, which, he said, it had no right to do. This may or may not be good law, but as a Liberal journal The Advertiser favors the extension, not the restriction, of the powers of a municipal corporation. In Great Britain municipal powers are wider than in this Province, and are being exercised for the benefit of the community. The city of London should have the privilege of engaging in the sale of electricity, though in that event it is in equity bound to show some consideration for any private enterprise which will be destroyed or injured by civic competition. Mr. Johnston is on surer ground when he challenges the right of the Legislature to validate a contract signed by the municipal corporation of London, upon which the ratepayers had no opportunity to vote. The municipal law gives them that right, and it has been taken away by act of parliament. Morally, if not legally, the Legislature has committed a wrong. Mr. Johnston contends that the legislation was illegal because it destroyed a civil right. In the similar case of the Cobalt Lake title, where the Government interfered between rival groups of claimants and ruled out of court Mr. Goldwin Smith argued that the chartered liberty of British subjects was superior to the act of a legislature. The point is of "enormous importance to our commonwealth, to our laws, and to our state," to quote Mr. Justice Riddell, and it is to be hoped that it will be referred to the judicial committee of the Privy Council, as Mr. McEvoy has promised.

A CANADIAN DINGLEYITE REBUKED.

"For my part," said Mr. Blain, member for Peel, during the recent debate in the House of Commons on the woolen duties, "I am in favor of a tariff high enough to keep out of Canada every dollar's worth of goods that we can produce or manufacture in Canada."

In the same debate Mr. Low, member for South Renfrew, a woolen manufacturer on a large scale, argued against the erection of a high tariff wall for the benefit of any class. He contended that the woolen industry had all the protection it needed. The British preference lowered the duty from 35 to 23½ per cent, but upon the woolen manufacturers representing that they could not compete upon this basis, the tariff was raised to 20 per cent. A further concession was the reduction of the duty on machinery used in woolen mills to 10 per cent, and the placing of raw material on the free list.

The Ottawa Journal, the editor of which, Mr. P. D. Ross, is president of the Ottawa Conservative Association, reads Mr. Blain a timely lecture. It declares that if the Conservative party were to father his view it would injure itself seriously; indeed, probably remain out of power indefinitely. The Journal points out that to give more protection than we already have would be not merely to bleed the people by entangling excessive prices for the product, but would lock up capital unprofitably, which should go into some business more suitable to Canada. It proceeds:

"If this country were to adopt such a dictum as Mr. Blain's, that we should keep out every dollar's worth of goods that we can produce, we would keep out great quantities of manufactures which could certainly be produced in Canada, but only at such a comparatively high cost that if our people were compelled to pay the proportionate retail prices, the expense of private living here would be desperately increased. We imagine that the people of Canada would refuse to have this sort of thing forced upon them to any greater degree than at present. At any rate, whatever might be argued, as to the possibility of such a doctrine being tolerated in Eastern Canada, there is no chance of the new Western Canada putting up with it; and, so from merely a party point of view, if the Conservative party hopes for any gain in the prairie provinces—where

It needs to gain if it is to succeed—the less said about high protectionism the better, Canada has a tariff more than high enough to contribute efficiently towards national solidarity, a tariff high enough to give ample protection to every Canadian industry which has a fair chance for existence, a tariff apparently well calculated to produce as large a revenue as our governments need to be entrusted with. We fancy, then, that it is a good tariff to let alone, except to cut down where undue business combinations are shown to be sheltered by it."

This is the common sense view, and it is encouraging to find it held by a thorough-going Conservative paper such as the Journal has become in recent years. Here and there a Conservative voice is lifted for high protection, but the leaders of the party prefer to leave the tariff issue in abeyance. The division of opinion in the opposition will be clearly revealed if the question of the woolen duties is pressed to a vote of the House.

JOE MARTIN'S FORLORN HOPE.

The Hon. Joe Martin is being introduced to British politics and uphills work at the same time. The Stratford-on-Avon division of Warwickshire, where he has been offered the Liberal nomination, returned Conservatives from 1886 to 1906, the majorities ranging from 439 in the former year to 1,771 in 1895, and 1,778 in 1901. The Liberals carried it by a majority of only 143 in 1906, the year of the Liberal tidal wave. The present vacancy has been caused by the resignation of the Liberal member, Capt. M. K. Smith, who was repudiated by the party executive for his vote against the government on the navy question. He is one of the two Liberals in the House of Commons who have deserted their party on this issue. As Capt. Smith is offering for re-election nominally as a Liberal, and as the Unionists also have a man in the field, Mr. Martin is evidently leading a forlorn hope.

There has been much in Mr. Martin's public career in Canada that Canadians could not approve. He destroyed his usefulness by an unreasonable jealousy of Mr. Sifton, and by his recklessness of language. In the present case, however, he happens to stand for everything that is desirable in British politics against a combination of jingoism, alcoholism, and reactionism, and Canadians ought to wish him well.

The Kinrade case will now take the middle of the stage again.

Mr. W. T. Stead predicts that Europe is on the verge of a great war. But Mr. Stead himself is unhappy unless he dwells in the midst of alarms.

The abdication of the Sultan is said to be at hand. Is it possible the old rascal will do something praiseworthy at last?

An English speaker compares the rivalry in armaments between Great Britain and Germany to a Japanese duel, in which each duelist cuts his own throat.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has shelved Mr. Comtee's power bill because it infringes provincial rights. Sir Wilfrid shows more regard for Liberal principles than some of his followers who have been supporting the bill.

Richard Blain, M. P., would shut every pound or yard of British goods out of Canada if similar goods could be made here. At the same time he professes to be in favor of imperial preferential trade. Blain is a humbug.

A Kansas Congressman wants Canadian wheat admitted free of duty until July in order to break up Patten's corner. It will not be long before the United States will admit Canadian wheat free of duty all the time, because the home crop will be less than the demand.

Mr. Lloyd-George deplores what he calls the "jump" feeling revealed by the naval scare. The Manchester Guardian utters this lament:

"We are making an exhibition of ourselves in the eyes of Europe, and also (as the comments of some Canadian papers clearly enough mention us) in the eyes of some of our own colonies. All the ships in the world will not avail us if in a time of real and not imagined crisis we are unable to show ourselves more restrained, more sober and more dignified than some of us are showing ourselves at the present moment."

This is for a time promised to open up an entirely new line of investigation. If substantiated by other evidence, it indicated sensational developments, eclipsing any of the dramatic incidents in this remarkable case. It suggested an entirely new motive for the crime.

Woodstock, Ont., April 20.—Elizabeth Davis, a middle-aged woman, was brought to jail last night on charges of bigamy and kidnapping. She appeared in police court this morning and was remanded. It is believed that she was married over 20 years ago to Charles Davis, now near Tillsonburg. Eleven years ago, according to the story of the police, she discarded Davis and married Fred Rogers and lived with him for several years. Last February she launched her third matrimonial venture, and got into a matrimonial tangle, and got through a form of marriage with Martin Cronkright, knowing that her original and second husbands were both living. When County Constable Dobson went out to arrest the woman she was found with Cronkright and eight young children, living in the poorest of quarters. They had one bedroom, in which the ten people slept, a small kitchen and pantry. There was absolutely nothing in the house in the way of provisions, save a dozen or so turnips, and according to the children the family has been living on turnips for some time. Three of the children are the woman's by Davis, two by Rogers, and three Cronkright's by a previous marriage. The wife, he claims, being dead, Cronkright was brought to jail charged with non-support of his family, and was released on bail. The woman admits her guilt, claiming in extenuation that her husband also married again, and first.

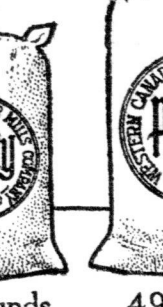
