CONTRACT LABOR CASE.

Firth Cliff, N. Y., Nov. 26.—The deportation of 53 contract laborers or their dependents, which has been ordered by Secretary Straus of the United States department of commerce and labor, because of an alleged unlawful agreement with the Firth Cliff carpet works, is believed to be an outcome of a strike which took place at the carpet works in August, 1907. When this strike ended some of the strike leaders were not re-employed by the company. Included among

these ordered deported are men, women and children, some of whom have been employed in the carpet works for three years.

WILL GOVERNMENT GRANT A FIAT

Or Will the Ontario Hydro-Power Commission Agree To Be Sued.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—Corporation Counsel Fullerton, for the city asked Mr. Justice Latchford today to strike out Walter D. Beardmore's statement of claim in his action against the city on the power contract with the hydro-electric commission to stay proceedings until the hydro-electric should be added as co-defendant. E. F. B. Johnston, K. C., opposed the motion.

Mr. Fullerton's grounds were these: "The action as revealed by the statement of claim is vexatious and frivolous, and no cause of action is shown."

Mr. Fullerton quoted a number of cases in support of his contention. Mr. Johnston denied that the action was vexatious and frivolous. One answer was that \$3,000,000 was involved. How, then, could it be frivolous?

Mr. Beardmore came as a ratepayer, as a person having to pay his taxes, and a large proportion of his taxes.

It was alleged that the hydro-electric commission had entered into some relation with the city, and, therefore, was a necessary party. Now, under the statute, the hydro-electric could not be sued, except with the Attorney-General's fiat. In the case of Smith vs. city of London, the plaintiff, so far, had been unable to obtain a fiat; had been unable, in fact, to have the matter before the Attorney-General. A delay of three months had resulted already. It would be seen that a case against the hydro-electric could be effectively blocked, and without the merits having been gone into.

No Fiat in London Case.
"The Smith people have been unable to get a fiat," went on Mr. Johnston. "The hydro-electric is an integral part of the Government. If we can't get a fiat our rights are blocked."

One question was, could his lordship let the action go on, the charges of fraud and misrepresentation being dropped?

"If you don't get a fiat, can't you amend your statement as to omit the hydro-electric?" asked Mr. Justice Latchford.

Mr. Johnston was willing that there should be such arrangement, as what he wanted more ornate than that the contract was ultra vires. In other words, while the bylaw passed by the people limited the price, the contract did not.

A "mandate from the people" is spoken of," said Mr. Johnston, "an expression more ornate than sensible, because the people did not authorize an unlimited maximum."

Mr. Johnston went on: "This is between us and the city; it's our quarrel."

"The hydro-electric commission is in the available position, that is cannot be sued without its consent," commented his lordship.

Easier in England.
Mr. Johnston assented, but added that in England, for instance, flats were granted on a prima facie case.

Mr. Fullerton thought the English conditions were the same as here. "Assume that nothing is done, that the city goes on, that a levy is made for taxes, and that Beardmore refuses to pay. The bailiff seizes, and we replevin the goods. Then we come to the issue, as to whether the contract is ultra vires."

"Assume that the people carry a bylaw for the building of a fire hall, and, instead, an hotel is put up, could the contractor be a party? The principle is the same. We are attacking a contract, alleging that it is ultra vires."

Will Commission Agree.
Mr. Justice Latchford saw the importance of the matter, and wondered if there could be a way of determining the merits without joining a party that could not be joined by the court, but could be joined by the party's own accord.

His lordship reserved judgment for a week. In the meantime the plaintiff might ask the Attorney-General for a fiat.

CUBA'S BIG ORANGE CROP.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 27.—The orange crop of Cuba this year will be the largest in the history of the island, and will reach 500,000 boxes, according to a report made to the bureau of manufactures by Consul R. E. Holaday, of Santiago de Cuba. The business of orange culture in the island, he says, is almost entirely in the hands of Americans.

"SANDY" BIGGER MAN THAN "BONY"

University Students Debated the Qualities of Alexander the Great and Napoleon I.

The regular meeting of the Western University Literary and Musical Society, was held in Convocation Hall last evening, and was well attended. The feature of the programme was a debate, resolved "That the career of Napoleon Bonaparte was more wonderful than that of Alexander the Great."

The points were all well taken, particularly by Miss Adams, who made one of the most brilliant addresses of the evening. Professor Patterson acted as critic and congratulated the speakers before giving his decision in favor of the negative.

During the evening musical numbers were rendered by Miss Blackburn, Mr. A. L. G. Clarke, Mr. P. J. Law, and Mrs. H. H. Ashby also gave a reading.

STRATHROY DEPOT TO BE IMPROVED

Grand Trunk Railway Is Doing There What Should Be Done.

The Strathroy "Age" says: As foreshadowed by an announcement in The Age a week or two ago, the Grand Trunk authorities are now moving to carry into effect the elaborate plans made for the remodeling of the interior of their station at Strathroy.

The freight office will be transferred from the freight sheds to the old baggage room at the extreme east end of the station, and the vacant apartment adjoining the ladies' waiting-room will be allotted to the agent for his office.

The quarters at present used by the agent, just off the gentlemen's waiting-room, will be furnished as a gentlemen's smoking parlor with a vestibule for lavatory. A toilette parlor for the ladies will also be equipped in the apartment adjoining their waiting-room.

The old freight office in the shipping shed will be used in future as a record room and storehouse for papers, files, etc.

Waterworks will be installed and everything arranged to afford the greatest possible comfort and convenience to both officials and the traveling public.

These improvements will be under way in a few days, as word has been received that work will be commenced immediately.
