SWALLOWED POISON.

Steuvenville, O., July 23.—A strange tale of the cause of the suicide of Nicholas M. Crane, a bridegroom of a few months, by swallowing a mixture of carbolic acid and washing fluid, has been uncovered.

Crane's wife, formerly Miss Sophia Grafton, was engaged to John Beestake previous to her marriage to Crane. The engaged couple even went as far as to arrange a marriage ceremony, but the bride, when her intended husband refused at the last moment to change his name, refused to become Mrs. Beestake and the wedding was called off. After Crane married the Grafton girl, Beestake, unworried, still boasted among his friends that Mrs. Crane would yet become Mrs. Beestake and declared that he would surely take her away from Crane, one of those who "kidded" her on changing her name to Beestake, and in this way stopped the intended wedding.

These threats on the part of Beestake, according to the story that Crane told relatives before he swallowed the poison, unhinged his mind and were the cause of his act.

Crane swallowed the poison in the presence of his father-in-law, John Grafton, who did not have time to interfere.

"Sophia can become Mrs. Beestake," he cried just before he swallowed the poison.

CONNAUGHT RESIGNS AS INSPECTOR GENERAL

London, July 24.—According to the Daily Express the Duke of Connaught has resigned the Inspector-generalship of the Mediterranean forces on the ground of "the immense nature of the work and the useless expenses to the nation involved therein."

The Duke of Connaught was appointed in January, 1908, to a command comprising the garrisons at Malta, Gibraltar, and the British troops in Egypt, the Sudan, Crete and Cyprus.

GIRLS SAY THEY WERE SOLD INTO SLAVERY

Two Little Chinese Lassies Tell Story of Abuse to New York Police.

New York, July 24.—Two round-checked little Chinese maids, their almond eyes very wide, their straight bangs brushed flat across their foreheads, their black braids, laced with scarlet silk, hanging precisely down the middle of their backs, stood demurely before a justice Wyatt in children's court yesterday, and swore to a story which left little sympathy in those who heard for the two elderly celestial merchants who reported their "children" missing to the police last Wednesday night.

Both little girls swore that they had been held against their will as household slaves, harshly treated, and forced to work long hours. They were accompanied by an agent of the Children's Bureau, who found them on the day following their disappearance from Chinatown at an east side parish house. The two made sworn statements which were read in court. They said they had been sold in China. Their story has aroused talk of another rigid investigation in Chinatown.

WORLD STILL LIKES TO BE BAMBOOZLED

Parisians Who Make Their Fortune by Trading on Childish Credulity.

Paris, July 20.—The world still wants to be deceived, but it is difficult to believe that there are any people left whose childish credulity makes the fortunes of persons such as M. and Mme. Talazac, who are being tried by the Paris courts. They style themselves "professors of hypnotism, astrology, sorcery and other occult sciences." The couple also trafficked in talismans and "fatal magnetized water," which was credited with remarkable properties. They asserted that the sprinkling of a few drops of it on a Friday night while the subject was sleeping would result in the realization of one's wishes. A "magic ring" enabling the possessor to find hidden treasure was sold for \$4, and four ounces of perspiration from the body of a man who hanged himself was said to produce magical results and could be had for \$5. A wolf's tooth, which preserved the owner from slander, only cost \$1; four nails from the coffin of a still-born child could be had for \$15. The subject of love, which exercised an irresistible attraction on indifferent persons cost only \$2. But the most valuable weapon in the sorcerer's armory was the skin of an infant covered with magical characters, which was able to "prolong life indefinitely," and cost \$20. For the head of a black cat which for five days had fed on human flesh. The sinister tradesman conferred dominion over all lesser powers of darkness. The accused received a large mass of correspondence, and their customers must have been very numerous. The male prisoner admitted that the "fatal water" was ordinary water boiled over a fire made with olive wood. The wolves' teeth he procured from the Paris zoo. The examination of this extraordinary case is still proceeding.

THE "ANTHER SNEAK"

Insubordination Brings Release for Six of the Suffragettes.

London, July 21.—Six out of fourteen suffragettes, who were recently imprisoned in the Holloway jail for breaking windows, have been released on account of insubordination, and Herbert Gladstone, secretary of state for home affairs, intimated in the House of Commons this afternoon that it was only a question of a few days until all of the women would be turned out as the "hunger strike" had been called general. Since the women were sentenced to close confinement they have been defying all the prison rules, and now Mr. Gladstone said they have taken to kicking and biting the female wardens. The home secretary declared during his speech that he had suggested that the cells were insanitary. Attempts made by the supporters of the suffragettes to adjourn the House in order to discuss the "infliction of punishment that was dangerous to the health of the ladies" was defeated by the Speaker, who refused to put the motion.
