

The Fake Bunt Assists the Base Runners



Stealing third has always been regarded as a stiff proposition, chiefly because of the short throw to third by the catcher, but the Giants are turning the trick frequently, aided materially by the batter.

The trick worked by the McGraw crew is called the "fake bunt." With

a runner on second, with none out, or with one out, the signal is passed, and as the pitcher starts his delivery the runner makes the usual bluff to go It is not unusual for the batter to lay down the ball under such cir-

cumstances, and in this case the man at the plate uses every means to make the infielders believe he intends to do so. The batter, if successful with his bluff, draws in the third baseman, but as the ball comes to him he draws back, permitting it to pass. The thirdsacker, having been coaxed to draw in, leaves the base unguarded, and it is

an easy matter for the runner to reach it.

If the bluff works the stealing of third is a cinch, and it is equally easy for a man on first to reach second, once the play is started.
