ITALIANS CAN'T CARE
FOR ALL WOUNDED

Carrying Out of Operations in
Tripoli Proving Difficult.

[Canadian Press.]

Rome (Via Frontier), Oct. 27.—As
the Italian operations in Tripoli pro-
ceed the difficulty of carrying out the
plans projected by the military ad-
ministration before the beginning of
hostilities, becomes apparent. It has
been found impracticable to care for
all the wounded cases as being
sent home, so that the camp will be
relieved of their care and protection.
Many officers and men who have
been slightly wounded object to being
sent home, and some have thrown off
their bandages and showed they were
able to resume their places in the
fight.

The Italian losses and other ob-
stacles in the way of an early con-
quest of Tripoli is strengthening the
position of that section of the public
which holds that Turkey should re-
ceive no compensation for the loss of
her province, and that Italy should not
even recognize the Sultan as the head
of the religion of the natives, although
granting liberty to all cities, including
the Mohammedan laws regarding
polygamy.

Music and Drama

A Welsh Choir.

Few male choirs ever appearing in
this city have presented a programme
of equal excellence to that rendered by
the Royal Maelwyn Choir in the Audi-
torium last night. The audience, which
was fairly large for a mid-week per-
formance, applauded them enthusias-
tically, and encored them again and
again. Unvarying excellence charac-
terized all the choral numbers, every
one of which was received with delight
by the music lovers present. The
opening number, a Welsh air, "Men of
Harlech," promised a programme of
unusual merit. The part-song, "Kil-
larny," called for the encore. "The
Shamrock of Ireland," both numbers
appealing strongly to the listeners.
Maundrell "To Arms" showed them
equally at home in singing more mar-
tial strains and the humorous "Italian
Salad," convulsed nearly everybody
in the programme. The stirring qualities
of Rille's "Martyrs of the Arena" were
well brought out, proving their ability
in serious as well as lighter airs.
The solo numbers were exceptionally
good. Perhaps the best were "The
Bell at Sea," by Mr. Ted Jones; "The
Children's Home," by Mr. Evan Lewis,
and "The Sailor's Grave," by Mr. J.
Cadwaldr Jones. Mr. Tom Egan
Humphreys rendered "Thora" very
well. He is a soloist of unusual prom-
ise. Mr. Gwendol Hughes and Mr.
J. E. Williams are also soloists of un-
deniable merit. Mr. Hughes sang
"Asleep on the Deep" in magnificent
voice, and then gave an encore, "The
Old Brigade."

Several excellent pianoforte solos
were artistically rendered by the ac-
companied, Miss A. E. Owen Davies.

New programmes will be given by
the Welsh choir tonight and Saturday
night, and no one should miss an op-
portunity to hear them at least one
evening.
