PORK FACTORY WAS BADLY SCORCHED

Hard Work by Firemen Alone Saved the Big St. Thomas Plant.

St. Thomas, Nov. 28.—Fire, which it is believed started from a spark from an engine, threatened for a time to wipe out the plant of the St. Thomas Pork Packing Company about midnight. When discovered the fire was blazing fiercely, and with a terrific gas blowing it was feared that the factory was doomed, as a large quantity of very inflammable material was stored in the building. The fire department, however, by sheer hard work checked the blaze and prevented it from spreading. The loss by fire will amount to \$2,000, and stock was damaged by water to the extent of several thousands.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED

FARM HELP.—Place the note given you for balance of your wages with a solicitor for collection. He will collect the amount with interest if the farmer has any property liable to execution for debt. You will have to pay the solicitor's fees before or after collection, as may be agreed with him, and he may require you to advance costs of court, which would ultimately be collected from the maker of the note. While driving into town, he is not liable for damages as a result of your lost opportunities to use the money, but only for interest.

CLERICS BARRED FROM THE POLLS

Sixteen Who Had Taken Vows of Poverty Disfranchised by Quebec Court Ruling.

Montreal, Nov. 29.—A case involving interesting points was argued yesterday in the Quebec court. The case was a petition presented by Emanuel Borneau, a candidate for the council of the town of Rigaud, asking that the names of sixteen occupants of the Catholic college of Rigaud be struck from the electoral lists. Thirteen of the persons involved are members of the Community of Clergy, and the other three are laymen. The petitioners claimed that the names of the clerics should be struck from the electoral lists, as they were not permitted to vote.

NO MORE LIQUOR AT SPEAKERS TABLE

The Hon. Dr. Sproule Establishes a New Precedent at the Speaker's Table.
