
Life and Death in Federal Trenches at Tampico; One Minute He Laughed; Next Minute He's Dead---That's War!

Photograph (2) was taken by the same photographer, while crouching in the same spot where he stood when he snapped (1)—behind the shelter of a stone wall. It was his next exposure, for while he was winding up his film, the Mexican soldier who had been laughing and smoking a cigarette, while watching his comrades shooting at rebels, was himself killed by a rebel bullet.
