

FIFTEEN CANADIANS HONORED BY KING

Degrees of Knighthood Conferred on Ten on Monarch's Birthday.

COLONEL HENDRIE IN LIST

Lord Kitchener Made Knight of the Garter—"Pats" Decorated.

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] LONDON, June 2.—Fifteen Canadians are mentioned in the list of honors conferred on the occasion of the King's birthday which was issued this evening. As has been expected, in view of the war, the list is an unusually long one.

Lieut.-Col. the Hon. John Strathairn Hendrie, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, and Dr. William Peterson, director of McGill University, Montreal, are to be Knights Commander, St. Michael and St. George.

Vice-Chancellor of Queen's Honored. Vice-Chancellor the Rev. D. M. Gordon, D.D., of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont.; Commander Richard M. Stephens, chief of staff of the Canadian navy service, are to be Companions of St. Michael and St. George.

Henry L. Drayton, K.C., chief commissioner of the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners; John C. Easton, Toronto; Charles F. Fraser, superintendent of the school for the blind, Halifax; H. B. Ames, member of Parliament for St. Antoine division and honorary secretary of the Canadian patriotic fund, Montreal, are to be Knight Bachelors.

Francis H. Gaborne, parliamentary counsel, Ottawa; Capt. Robert Macdonald, late superintendent Royal North-west Mounted Police, will be Companions of the Imperial Service Order.

Kitchener Heads List. The list is headed by the names of Field Marshal Earl Kitchener, secretary of state for war, who received the Knighthood of the Garter, and Sir Francis Bertie, ambassador to France, and Sir Kenneth Muir McKenzie, clerk of the Crown. The latter two are the only servants of the Crown who were raised to the peerage, each having been made a baron.

Recognize Canadian Gallantry.

Gallantry in saving life and coolness under heavy fire of the enemy's guns on the part of the Canadian troops has been recognized. Pte. R. H. Bost, 2nd Battalion, Canadian Trench, has been awarded the distinguished conduct medal for "conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty" on the night of March 24th, when he went out under a withering fire to give assistance to wounded comrades. He was almost immediately wounded, but succeeded in dragging one man to safety, then rendering first aid to him and saving his life.

Pte. Hacking and Pte. J. M. Robinson, the Princess Pats, will be decorated "conspicuous gallantry" at St. Eloi on February 25, when both assisted in saving wounded comrades under most difficult and dangerous circumstances.

Decorated For Bravery.

Serjeant S. V. Patterson, of the Princess Pats, will be honored for the dash and gallantry he led his platoon against a German trench, drove out the enemy, and carried important messages on two occasions safely to British outposts at St. Eloi while exposed to the enemy's heavy fire, and subsequently conducting stretcher bearers in the darkness to the rescue of wounded, Corp. J. L. Wolstenholme will also be decorated.

Order of Bath.

Following is a long list of officers of the army and navy who received promotion in, or appointment to, the Order of the Bath, chiefly for services in connection with the organization of various departments, such as recruiting and training of the territorials and the new armies, naval construction, equipment and transport, which have demanded special attention since the outbreak of the war.

It is mentioned in the communication

making the list public, that a further list of honors conferred in recognition of meritorious services during the war will be announced later, which probably means that the list of the present list, who are not included in the present list, will then come in for their share of honors.

Few Political Honors.

The list contains very few political honors. Half a dozen members of the House of Commons, both Liberal and Unionist, are appointed to the Order, and an equal number receive baronetcies. Among the latter are Sir Gilbert Parker, the novelist, and Sir Henry Norman, Liberal member of Parliament.

Twenty persons are given knight-

hoods, among them E. L. Fletcher, one of the managers of the White Star Line, for services in connection with the transport of troops; Charles Edward Foy, the fisheries expert; Leo G. C. Money, Liberal member of Parliament; Edgar Bowring, Newfoundland, chief railway commissioner, and a number of officers in the civil service.

Sir John Newell Jordan, minister to

China, is appointed a privy councillor. Right Hon. Sir James Renell Rodd, ambassador to Italy, is given the Grand Cross of St. Michael and St. George; Charles Louis Des Oza, minister to Serbia, and Francis William Strong, minister to Chile, are made Knights Commanders of St. Michael and St. George.
