#### Engineer Recruits For Overseas Draft NO MORE PROTECTION FOR HOSPITAL SHIPS

[Canadian Press.]

London, July 21 .- A Reuter's Petrograd dispatch says that the Russian minister of foreign affairs has inform ed the Turkish Government, through the ambassadors of the United States disregard the principles of The Hague convention as far as Turkish hospital ships are concerned

The Russian hospital ship Portugal was sunk by a submarine in the Black time, and 115 lives were lost. It was sunk by a German submarine, but Turkey later accepted the responsibility declaring that the ship did not fly the Red Cross flag, and was mistaken for a transport. On July 9 the Vperiode, which took the place of the Portugal, was torpedoed and sent to the bottom while on her way to Batum to embark wounded soldiers.


