BRUCE REPRESENTATIVES DEEPLY DISAPPOINTED AS OFFICERS DO NOT APPEAR

Lieut.-Cols. McCrimmon and Williams Not Present at Meeting Former Requested.

[Special to The Advertiser.] WALKERTON, July 20.—About ten days ago, at the special request of Lieut.-Col. McCrimmon, the president of the Bruce Preparedness League called a meeting of the league and the various reeves, mayors, representative men throughout the county to meet at Walkerton on July 20 to hear addresses from Lieut.-Cols. McCrimmon and Williams. A representative meeting of the men of the county was held in the court house today at 2 p.m., but neither of the gentlemen made his appearance. After discussion the following motion was passed: "That this meeting of representative men of Bruce County, assembled at the request of Col. McCrimmon at the call of the president of the Bruce Preparedness League to hear Col. McCrimmon and Lieut.-Col. Williams on the question of recruiting, are deeply disappointed that this gathering was unable to be enlightened on this matter owing to the non-appearance of either of these gentlemen. This meeting desires to point out that Bruce County has contributed in men and money, and while still willing to do more, yet need is shown, it awaits more responsible leadership in this great matter of Empire service."

50 A. M. C. MEN FROM HERE GOING EASTWARD

Draft Called From Training Depot For Valcartier Camp.

A draft of one sergeant, two corporals and 47 men from No. 1 Ambulance Training Depot, A. M. C., will shortly be transferred to No. 4 A. T. D. at Valcartier. The men have not yet been chosen, but it is stated that they will be named and dispatched to the eastern camp early next week. This is one of the consequences of the removal of eight battalions to Camp Borden. Although there are 243 men still in the field hospital at Carling Camp, most of them have not yet been chosen, and it is expected will soon be to rejoin their units. The infectious ward is almost empty, and that part of the hospital will be largely dismantled on Monday next. The reduction of the staff has been expected for some time and causes no comment among the officers of the unit.

15,000 SOLDIERS LEAVE CAMP BORDEN TODAY

CAMP BORDEN, July 20.—Orders today place restrictions on the camp visitors. From now on the troops can only entertain their families and friends on Saturday afternoons and Sundays. Fourteen special trains will be run tomorrow to convey 15,000 soldiers on their last leave from the big camp near Barrie, most of these are from Toronto, with two from Brantford, Galt and London, on each road.

Capt. R. H. Stapleford, Watford, of the 149th Battalion, formerly at the front with the 1st Battalion, where he was wounded at Ypres, has been promoted at Camp Borden to the position of staff captain under Col. Howard of the 8th Brigade. He was in charge of the machine gun section of the 149th.

CAN DOUBLE UP

Companies Allowed to Amalgamate For Training.

Owing to the absence of such a large number of men on harvest furlough, training of infantry units has been somewhat disturbed. Orders today advise that companies too seriously reduced in strength to carry out the training should be doubled up in order that the work may be effectively carried on.

WALKED FROM CLANDEBOVE. Another evidence of the popularity of the 63rd Battery is shown by the fact that Edward Lyons walked all the way from Clansville to sign with it. Another recruit, David Wishart, has signed up with the Engineers.

CAN RECRUIT HERE. Authority has been granted for the 19th Overseas Battalion (Irish Rangers) to recruit in No. 1 Military District.

ARRANGE OWN SERVICES. Commanding officers of battalions have been instructed to make their own arrangements for church parades on Sunday, July 23. Roman Catholic soldiers, as usual, will be marched in a body to St. Michael's Church.

25,000 AT CAMP HUGHES. WINNIPEG, July 20.—At Camp Hughes there are 25,000 soldiers, outside of camp there are 4,000, and in Winnipeg, 1,400, total of 31,400 in military district No. 10.

COMPLETING DETAILS

Secretary Philip Working on Expansion Excursion Arrangements.

Gordon Philip, secretary of the board of trade, is completing the arrangements for the trade excursion excursion to Cleveland on Tuesday evening. There is considerable enthusiasm for the trip, and it is expected that fully 100 will go across. The Ad Club will also send a delegation, and will be the guests of the Cleveland Ad Club. "We expect to make a good showing," said Mr. Philip.

LITTLE STORIES OF CAMP BORDEN

Arrangements for officers' week-end leave have been completed, and from now on as many as one-third of the officers can be on leave at the same time. This increase follows the extra leave granted the enlisted men in the way of two week-end leaves per month.

Further cases of poison ivy victims have been reported, and while the numbers are claimed to be but small, the question of prevention is still one of paramount importance to the medical service of the camp.

The medical authorities claim that the number of cases of hoarseness, developing among the officers, is not due to the Camp Borden variety of sand, but to the fact that the officers are sleeping in the grounds.

Additional postoffice accommodation has been made necessary by the heavy volume of mail both to and from the camp. A large addition to the main postoffice building has been started, and four branch or sub-postoffices have been opened in the camp.

Wireless equipment is the latest to be added to the camp fixtures. A station, now in process of erection, will be equipped to transmit and receive messages from the station already in operation at Niagara Camp. Training of wireless operators will be facilitated by these two stations, it is claimed.

Because of the excessive heat the majority of the brigade route marches ordered for yesterday, were cut down to six miles instead of the prescribed twelve.

A provisional school of instruction for officers will be opened next week. The initial attendance will be 200 at least.

125th Battalion, Brant County—Lieut.-Col. M. E. Cutliff, 38 officers and 1,065 men; at Borden.

126th Battalion, Peel County—Lieut.-Col. P. A. Hamilton, 38 officers and 1,026 men; at Borden.

127th Battalion, York County—Lieut.-Col. F. F. Clarke, 37 officers and 1,098 men; at Borden.

128th Battalion, Wentworth County—Lieut.-Col. W. E. S. Knowles, 35 officers and 976 men; at Borden.

131th Highlanders, Toronto—Lieut.-Col. Duncan Donald, 35 officers and 1,132 men; at Borden.

135th Battalion, Middlesex County—Lieut.-Col. B. Robson, 43 officers and 1,020 men.

Brig.-Gen. Logie, camp commandant, has expressed his forcible opinions in reference to the complaint of officers that they cannot get leave.

"I have not had a day's leave since January, 1915, and every officer should try at least to play the game," said Gen. Logie.

"It makes me sore to see these young officers kicking about not being able to go to Toronto every week to show themselves off. They ought to be careful because there are six hundred officers waiting for the first opening."

Saturday afternoon and Sundays have been designated as the official visiting days of the camp. Visitors will not be allowed on other days.

The medical examination of all men in those battalions that have been warned for overseas service, is being rushed through as speedily as possible. All men who are absent from their units on harvest furlough have been ordered to report back to Camp Borden at once.

Orders have been issued that anyone who fails to return on the special week-end trains will be fined. The trainmen will also miss any further week-end trips, for future leave will be cancelled.

Officers have been ordered to take one hour's physical training every morning. Some of the officers, it is claimed, have been lax in their attendance at the P. T. training parade, but it is now compulsory.

Two hours' rain yesterday brought considerable relief from the excessive heat of the past three weeks at Camp Borden. The downpour came at noon and was followed by another in the evening.

The number of "absent without leave" is being closely reduced. Yesterday it was 56 less than the day before, and there are still 1,150 who are classed as absentees.

Because of the early exodus of troops from Camp Borden, Capt. Flanagan is arranging for a special field day in the camp stadium on a date which will catch practically every man in camp.

Next Tuesday night the "sport when a boxing tournament and a moving picture show will be held.

FORMER 135TH SOLDIER SENTENCED FOR YEAR

Man Convicted of Bigamy Goes to Pen.

"The sentence I am going to impose for the crime of bigamy of which you were found guilty, was, act, I hope, as a deterrent to others, and I hope you will conduct yourself differently when you come out," said Magistrate J. C. Judd today, in sentencing George Barrett to one year's imprisonment on the bigamy charge of which he was found guilty at the trial last week.

Barrett was formerly a member of the 135th Battalion, and had married a Guelph girl while he still had a wife living in Belleville.

Photographs of Barrett and his first wife taken in Belleville, were submitted at the trial, in addition to the evidence of Belleville witnesses, the evidence against Barrett being of the most convincing character.

Notwithstanding the overwhelming evidence, Barrett still maintained his innocence, and when asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not be passed, replied:

"I am innocent and should not be sent to jail for something I never did."

Yes, but you have been found guilty, though after a fair and impartial trial, and your declarations of innocence at this time cannot in any way influence me.

You have acted in a dastardly manner towards these women, and you must expect punishment, which in your case I hope will be a lesson to deter other bigamists from this crime, said Magistrate Judd in passing sentence.

W. R. Meredith, on behalf of the prisoner, asked that the magistrate exercise leniency, considering the fact that the prisoner was a soldier.

ADVISED TO ENLIST BY MAGISTRATE JUDD

Railway Trespasser Told to Don Khaki—Police Gist.

William Bradford, who had been allowed out on suspended sentence several months ago, appeared again today in a charge of trespassing, the complainant being the C. P. R. Company. "I gave you a chance before, I am going to give you another, but mind this is the last. Now I would advise you to attempt to join his majesty's forces and get a right grip on yourself," again said Magistrate J. C. Judd in suspending sentence.

"Orated" On Street.

MANITOBA EX-MINISTERS TO BE TRIED MONDAY

Also Probe Into the Construction of the Agricultural College.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Winnipeg, Man., July 20.—For three days Hartley Dewart of Toronto has been arguing before the court of appeal that the conduct of Contractor Thomas Kelly's case was not legal at the time a jury convicted him of theft and conspiracy in the Parliament Buildings construction. Crown counsel is now replying and argument must close tomorrow afternoon.

The ex-ministers' trial on the same charges begins Monday, and the probe into Manitoba's Agricultural College by Judge Galt will also get under way next week.

In these buildings Kelly had a million and a half dollar contract, which ran up to a million more. It is this extra million payment that is the cause of the inquiry. Hon. Robert Rogers was minister of public works here at the time.

AMERICAN SCHOONER TAKEN BY THE GERMANS

London, July 21.—The American schooner Prince Valdemar has been captured by a German warship while on its way from Philadelphia to Sweden with a cargo of oil, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, quoting the Copenhagen Politiken.

The schooner was taken into Swinemunde.

The only American schooner of this name which is listed here belongs to George McNear of San Francisco. The McNear firm is one of those included in the recent British blacklist.

NO MORE PROTECTION FOR HOSPITAL SHIPS

London, July 21.—A Russian Petrograd dispatch says that the Russian minister of foreign affairs has informed the Turkish Government through the ambassadors of the United States and Spain, that Russia will henceforth disregard the principles of the Hague convention as far as Turkish hospital ships are concerned.

The Russian hospital ship Portugal was sunk by a German submarine in the Black Sea last March. There were a large number of wounded on board at the time, and 115 lives were lost. It was at first stated that the ship had been sunk by a German submarine, but Turkey later accepted the responsibility, declaring that the ship did not fly the Red Cross flag, and was mistaken for a transport. On July 9 the Portuguese, which took the place of the Portugal, was torpedoed and sent to the bottom while on her way to Batum to embark wounded soldiers.
