

BRITISH HOLDING ALL LATEST GAINS; AVIATORS ARE BUSY STANISLAU CAPTURED BY THE MUSCOVITES WHO PURSUE HUNS

Brussels Zeppelin Sheds Are
Among Places Shelled.

BUSIGNY STATION TWICE RAILWAY SIDINGS AT MONS AND NAMUR ALSO HEAVILY BOMBED.

Another Notable Triumph For
Czar's Men.

MONASTERZYSKA IS TAKEN AUSTRO-GERMANS COMPELLED TO RETIRE FROM FORTIFIED POSITIONS.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—12:50 a.m.—The official statement issued by the British war office shortly after midnight reads as follows:

"Between the Ancre and the Somme the situation is unchanged. On the rest of the British front there is normal trench warfare."

"Besides numerous daily raids, some successful long distance raids recently have been carried out by the flying corps against the following objectives: Zeppelin sheds at Brussels, railway sidings at Mons, railway sidings and airship sheds at Namur, Busigny railway station (twice). Of the 68 machines which participated, only two failed to return."

Further progress.

The day official statement said: "Last night the enemy opened heavy machine gun and rifle fire on Highwood, followed by an artillery barrage on the back area. We replied effectively."

"North of Bazentin-le-Petit we made further progress, taking a short length of trenches and inflicting considerable loss on the enemy. At 8:45 a.m. the enemy made a determined counter-attack on the trenches captured by us. This attack was repulsed with heavy loss to the enemy."

"Northwest of Pozieres we also advanced our line slightly at certain places."

"Near Neuville St. Vaast we exploded a mine last night and opened the crater with little opposition. South of Ypres we successfully raided a farm in the enemy lines. On the remainder of the front there was no event of importance."

GREEK PASSENGER SHIP TAKES FIRE; FORTY KILLED

Captain Manages to Beach Eletheria
With Most on Board.

ATHENS, Aug. 11, via Paris, Aug. 11.—The Greek steamer Eletheria, bound from Saloniki to Volo with a cargo of oil, owned by an American company, and 1,200 passengers, principally disabled troops, caught fire today off the island of Skiatthos. Forty persons were killed and many were injured. The captain of the Eletheria succeeded finally in beaching his vessel.

The island of Skiatthos is one of the northern Sporades group in the Aegean sea. Volo is the principal seaport of Thessaly.

Available shipping records do not mention the Greek steamer Eletheria.

EXPLOSION KILLS 20 IN DUESTI, ROMANIA

Blowing Up of Powder Magazine Injures
150 Others.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Twenty persons were killed and 150 injured by the accidental explosion of a military powder magazine at Duesti in Rumania, says a Reuters dispatch from the Rumanian capital. The material damage was small and work at the powder plant continues.

BREAD UP IN OWEN SOUND.
OWEN SOUND, Aug. 11.—The price of bread was advanced one cent here this week, and consumers are now asked to pay fourteen cents for a large loaf of bread and seven cents for a small loaf. This is the first advance in price since the war began.

BIG WINNIPEG FIRE.

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MONASTERZYSKA IS TAKEN AUSTRO-GERMANS COMPELLED TO RETIRE FROM FORTIFIED POSITIONS.

Petrograd, via London, Aug. 11.—8:07 p.m.—Stanislaw, an important railroad centre southeast of Lemberg, capital of Galicia, has been occupied by Russian troops. The taking of Stanislaw is announced in the official statement given out this evening. The troops of Gen. Letchitzky captured Stanislaw Thursday evening and pursued the Austrians who retreated in the direction of Halitz.

The Russians have also made important successes in the Sereth region. They compelled the Austro-Germans to retire from the fortified positions of Gladaka and Vorobievsk and have occupied the town of Monasterzyska. The official statement reads:

"As a result of our success on the River Sereth in the region of Nesterovce and Yankovce, the enemy was compelled to retire from the fortified positions of Gladaka and Vorobievsk. In conjunction with the success achieved by us in the vicinity of the Monasterzyska-Niznizof railway line, our troops resumed the offensive in the region north of Monasterzyska. After capturing an enemy position by assault, our troops advanced to the middle of Kovopole, and after driving the enemy from fortified works, definitely occupied the town of Monasterzyska."

Pursuing the Enemy.

"One of our mounted machine gun detachments under Lieut. Plechokov, after having repaired the destroyed bridge at Monasterzyska, pushed along to the rear of the third German reserve regiment, and the latter, still offering resistance, was annihilated by our armored machine guns. In the vicinity of the confluence of the Zlota Lipa, our cavalry detachments, continuing the advance, occupied the village of Ustiezehone at the junction of the river of Khorovanka with the Dniester and also the village of Mindigorie, north of Ustiezehone."

Pursuing the Enemy.

"Thus, the troops of Gen. Letchitzky achieved an important success. The Russian troops, continuing the advance, captured the village of Stanislaw, captured that town at 7:45 o'clock yesterday (Thursday) evening. Thereafter he pursued the enemy, who retreated in the direction of Halitz. Several explosions were heard previous to the evacuation of the town by the enemy."

On account of the pressure brought to bear on the enemy, he evacuated the left bank of the River Bystritsa and our detachments began to pour into the other bank, meanwhile pouring life and machine gun fire into the retreating enemy.

"Caucasian front—Under Turkish pressure, troops have withdrawn from Hamadan, Persia."

IMPORTANT CENTRE.
The capture of Stanislaw gives the Russians another gateway through which they can march toward Lemberg. Like Brody, Stanislaw is an important railway junction. It is 37 miles southeast of Lemberg and is situated between two forks of the Bystritsa River, ten miles south of the Dniester and agricultural centre before the war and had a population of 35,000.

LEMBERG NEXT.
LONDON, Aug. 11.—A further series of surprising successes by the armies of Generals Sahharoff and Letchitzky were announced today by the Russians. The most important of these successes were the capture of the important railway junction and town of Stanislaw; the definite occupation of Monasterzyska and the seizure of important positions on the Zlota Lipa line. Coupled with these victories was the capture of many thousands of prisoners, especially on the right bank of the Sereth. The Germans appeared to regard the Kovel-Lemberg sector as the most critical on the eastern front, and the appointment of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to the chief command undoubtedly had the effect of temporarily stunning the Russian advance on the northern section of the line. Field Marshal Von Hindenburg does not hold the controlling command over the troops pending the southern approach to Lemberg, where Gen. Letchitzky, having taken Stanislaw and being with in striking distance of Halitz, is rapidly completing his encirclement of the army of Gen. Count Von Bothmer. The latter's forces have held obstinately their positions since last winter, and have kept them virtually intact. However, it cannot be long now before the fate of Lemberg is sealed, military observers believe.

LIEBKNECHT'S APPEAL TO
BE HEARD ON AUGUST 16

LONDON, Aug. 11.—A dispatch to Reuters Telegram Company from Amsterdam saying that the appeal of Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the German Socialist leader, from a sentence of thirty months' penal servitude and dismissal from the army for attempted high treason, gross insubordination and resistance to the authorities, will probably be heard August 16 before the superior war tribunal in Berlin.

CHURCH DESTROYED.

Rome, Aug. 12.—The Church of Santa Maria Formosa was destroyed in the Austrian airplane raid on Venice on the night of August 10. Nearly all of the works of art in the church had been removed months ago.

The Church of Santa Maria Formosa was several centuries old. Its exact building date being unknown, it was remodelled in 1699. One of its altars was considered the masterpiece of Venetian art. Another altar was erected in 1473. The church also contained Madonnas by Sassoferato and Pietro Da Massina.

DANISH SHIP SEIZED.
COPENHAGEN, via London, Aug. 12.—2:30 a.m.—The Danish steamer Ajax Blyth, bound for Copenhagen with a load of coal for the Danish navy, has been seized off Elsinore by a German warship, and taken to Swinemunde, local newspapers report.

TWO YOUNG LADIES DIE.
BRUSSELS, Aug. 11.—This week Mrs. John Goushier of Morris Township, and his wife, Mrs. Bessie Mann of Morris, died in their youth. Neither was 21 years of age. Cancer and heart complications were the respective causes of their deaths.

Vienna Admits Loss of Stanislaw

VIENNA, Aug. 11, via London. —11:36 p.m.—"We have evacuated Stanislaw without fighting," says the official statement issued from general headquarters today. The statement also admits the withdrawal of Austrian troops to new positions in the Stanislaw Monasterzyska regions owing to the Russian pressure.

RUSSIAN PREMIER GIVES ASSURANCE OF STEADFASTNESS

Will Work With Britain in
Every Particular.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 11.—Via London. 8:40 p.m.—The rumors which were circulated following Premier Sturmer's appointment as foreign minister, that Russia might entertain proposals for a separate peace, have elicited a definite denial of such a possibility from the Russian foreign minister. In denying the rumors to a correspondent of the Ruskoy Slovo, the premier said: "I have learned that my appointment is commented upon in some circles as forecasting a separate peace. I desire to strengthen the public belief that the change in the post of foreign minister must not be considered in any sense an indication of a variation of Russia from the line of conduct of the last two years toward her allies. The agreement with them will not be changed."

"Russia considers it her duty to accomplish with regard to Germany and I, as a tool in the hands of the emperor, will do my best to work hand in hand with our allies, and will strive to strengthen the friendship between Russia, Britain and France."

BETHMANN-HOLLWEG CLOSED WITH FRANZ

Enemy Conference at Vienna Over
Poland.

Amsterdam, via London, Aug. 12.—A Vienna dispatch says that Emperor Francis Joseph has received the German chancellor, Von Bethmann-Hollweg, in audience. Later the emperor was closeted with the German foreign minister, Gottlieb Von Jagow.

An official communication issued at Berlin on Thursday stated that Chancellor Von Jagow had gone to Vienna to visit Baron Burián, Rajec, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister. The purpose of the conference was stated to concern territory occupied by the Central Powers. An official advice stated that Poland was the question at issue.

FIRE CHIEFS FINISH ANNUAL DELIBERATIONS

Canadian Twin Cities Have Next Meeting—Winnipeg Chief Present.

WINDSOR, Aug. 11.—Members of the Dominion Association of Fire Chiefs at its final business session this morning chose the twin cities of Port Arthur and Fort William as the meeting-place for 1917.

Chief J. G. Buchanan of Winnipeg, vice-president of the association, was the unanimous choice for president.

BUCHAREST EXPLOSION KILLED 115 PERSONS

London, Aug. 12.—12:35 p.m.—According to a telegram from Bucharest the number of persons killed in the explosion in the powder factory at Dulesti was 115. Earlier reports stated that only 20 persons had been killed.

REV. E. S. RUPERT DIES; WELL KNOWN IN DISTRICT

Superannuated Methodist Minister Has
Passed Away in Toronto.

TORONTO, Aug. 11.—A former Western Ontario Methodist minister, Rev. E. S. Rupert, died today in his 81st year. For many years he had been on the superannuation list, and had lately lived with his son, W. T. Rupert. He had been in the active ministry for over 40 years, having had charge at Clinton, Parry Sound, Grahamsville, Milverton and Paisley parishes.

OFF TO LABRADOR

Hudson's Bay Steamer Leaves Montreal—Police Aboard.

MONTREAL, Aug. 11.—Loaded almost to capacity the Hudson Bay Company's steamship Nascopee started at noon today for the long journey up the Labrador coast and across Hudson Bay to Chesterfield Inlet, where she will resume her pre-war occupation. Aboard her are four Mounted Police officers going north after two Eskimo murderers.

TWO SHIPS SUNK.
LONDON, Aug. 11.—Lloyds shipping agency announces that the French sailing vessel Annette Marie (117 tons), the French steamer, Henri Elisa (622 tons), and the steamer Robert, nationality not given, have been sunk.

TOBIAS SMUTS DEAD.

Cape Town, U. of S. A., Aug. 12.—Via London, 12:15 p.m.—General Tobias Smuts, member of parliament, is dead. General Smuts was a candidate for the presidency of the Transvaal in 1897 against Paul Kruger. He took a prominent part in the Boer war.

\$400 FOR RED CROSS.
KINCARDINE, Aug. 11.—The ladies of the Red Cross Society of Kincardine held a garden party in the pavilion Thursday afternoon and evening. A good program and dancing were the features of the evening, and when all the returns had been handed in it was found that \$400 had been the proceeds. This will be used in local Red Cross work.

NOTED BANKER DEAD.
PARIS, Aug. 11.—David Kahn, head of the international banking firm of Lazard Freres is dead.

BULGARIANS DRIVEN FROM DOIRAN TOWN BY ANGLO-FRENCH

Hill Also Captured Northwest
of Saloniki.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—1:50 p.m.—An attack by Anglo-French forces on the Bulgarians at Doiran, eight miles northwest of Saloniki, is reported in a Havas dispatch from Saloniki. The Allies occupied the Doiran railway station and a neighboring hill.

In front of captured positions, the bodies of numerous Bulgarians were found. The attack was preceded by a vigorous bombardment. At other points along the front artillery fighting continues, with patrol engagements along the Serbian border.

Duel Renewed.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—4:25 p.m.—Reuters correspondent at Saloniki telegraphs that the artillery duel on the Balkan front has been renewed. The height captured by the Anglo-French forces is Hill 227, south of Doiran. The railway station lies five miles east of the town.

There have been several small engagements recently along this front as well as frequent heavy artillery battles. A general offensive movement on the part of the army of French, British and Serbian troops based on Saloniki, which is reported to number nearly 700,000, has been going on for several weeks. The engagement near Doiran, however, apparently was a minor affair.

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FRENCH CUSTOMS GROW TO TWICE NORMAL SIZE

PARIS, Aug. 11.—French customs receipts for July as shown by official figures issued today, were more than twice as much as in the same month

in normal years. They amounted to 121,000,000 francs as compared with an average of about 58,000,000. Of the total for July, 46,000,000 francs was realized from imports of military supplies. Government receipts of all kinds exceeded those of July, 1915, by 65,000,000 francs and were within 26,000,000 of average years, indicating an approach to normal interior conditions, as the figures do not include the new taxes
