Planning to Raise Turkeys? Put This In Your Scrap Book

Dear Aunt Maria,-In a recent issue of The Advertiser I noticed that you had been discussing poultry raising with a man and his wife who had only been on a farm for a short time, where they had gone for the benefit of their little daughter's health.

The man stated that he intended raising turkeys next year, and that

ne had told him to tie the mother hen up to prevent her wandering Now, as a farmer's daughter, and one who was fond of working among the poultry, would say if he tried that plan he would make a mistake. The better plan is to put the turkey eggs under the common hen and, after the eggs hatch, put the hen in a crate made of lath or small boards, leaving a place for the turkeys to run out. After two or three weeks, let the hen out with them when the grass is dry.

As soon as the turkeys are hatched, sift insect powder over them and the hen, and do this now and again to keep them free from insects.

As to feed we gave our turkeys stale bread moistened in water, press ing as much of the water out as possible. After three weeks the turkeys mig as much of the water of the same possible to the first three weeks, and gave them plenty of clean water in flat dishes. We




