BERLIN, Sept. 7. - Bank notes totalling twenty-three billion paper marks have been put into circulation within the last ten days, according to the newspapers here. This is ten per cent of Germany's entire note circulation. The printing presses are now issuing 2.500,000,000 papers marks daily, and it is hoped that the output will be increased during the present month to 000,000,000 daily. The latter figure is expected to meet the present shortage of paper money.


