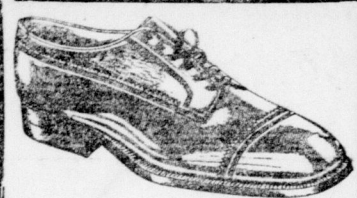

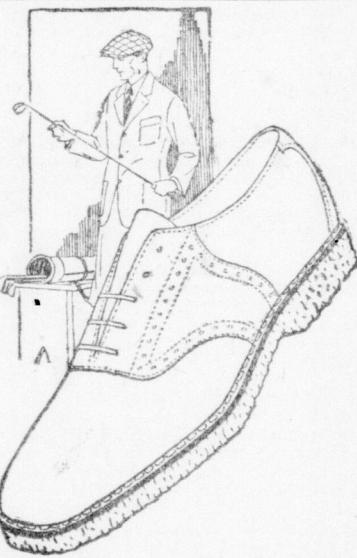

PEACE IS URGED IN RESOLUTION

Religious Society of Friends
Holds Annual Session
in Toronto.

CADETS DISCUSSED

Urging world peace, a resolution
similar to that recently adopted by
the Men's Brotherhood Federations
of this city, was passed unanimously
by the Religious Society of Friends
at the Tuesday afternoon session of
their annual convention in Toronto.

Professor A. G. Durand, one of those
instrumental in presenting the peace
movement in this city, was made
clerk, or presiding officer, of the
Canada Yearling Meeting of the So-
ciety of Friends, which was adjourned
to meet in Toronto next year.

The resolution reads as follows:
"Believing that the golden rule
grants no exceptions to nations, and
is as binding on groups of people as
on individuals, and that the con-
tinued recognition of war as a legal
method of settling disputes between
nations is a survival of barbarism, a
travesty of justice, a negation of
morality and religion, and a menace
to the very existence of our Christian
civilization:

"We support the participation of
Canada in the League of Nations as
a practical effort to substitute justice
and law for violence and anarchy in
international affairs.

"We pledge to the government of
our country our unflinching support
in all efforts to limit the creation of
new means and materials for war,
beyond the actual needs of a police
force.

"We believe that all agencies of
education should contribute to im-
proving international understanding
and should teach history in terms of
human achievement rather than in
terms of war.

"We feel that the time has come
for all organizations, either religious
or civil, existing in the interest of
human welfare, to proclaim the out-
lawry of war as a method of settling
international disputes."

A further resolution was also
adopted, endorsing the policy
of the government in subsidizing
cadet training in the schools, and
urging that the care and attention of
the government should be given in
an increasing degree to the pro-
tection among the young of the ideals
of friendliness and goodwill, upon
which the attainment of international
peace must ultimately rest.

The second annual inspection of
Cadet Corps, No. 1068, of the High-
land and Manor Park school, took
place Monday on the school campus.
The corps was inspected by Lieut.-
Col. F. E. Ware, D.S.O., of the dis-
trict general staff.

Many interested citizens of the
park witnessed the manoeuvres,
which consisted of the different
movements in company and platoon
drill, and the physical training. At
the conclusion of the inspection the
corps was drawn up and addressed
by Rev. W. M. Shore and Trustee T.
Taylor.

Col. Ware then gave a convincing
address on the cadet movement,
showing that the boys were bene-
fitted physically, mentally and mor-
ally from the training that they had
received, and the value that such
training would be to them after leav-
ing school. He complimented the in-
structor and the cadets. He made
special mention of the officers of the
corps on their good work, the officers
being: Capt. Fred Wakarrell, Lieut.
Lewie Edwards, Wilfrid Morley,
Ralph Murray and Harry Jones.

Col. Ware stated that much credit
was due to the way the cadets were
fitted out in such neat and serviceable
uniforms. In this respect mention
should be made of P. W. Murray,
general merchant of Manor Park,
the school board and the cadets
themselves.

COMMITTEE TO PROBE INDIA ACT DEFECTS

Appointment Is Response to
India's Demand for Round
Table Conference.

Associated Press Despatch.
London, June 20.—The India Office
has announced that the government
of India, with the approval of the
secretary for India, has decided to
appoint a committee to inquire into
the difficulties and defects in the
working of the government of India
act, and to determine the feasibility
of obtaining remedies for such de-
fects as are consistent with the
structure, purposes and policies of
the act.

The membership of the committee
will be both Indian and British, under
the chairmanship of Sir Alexander
Maddison. It will hold its sessions
at Simla, and report to the govern-
ment.

The appointment of the committee
is apparently the government's re-
sponse to India's demand for a round
table conference on question of Indian
administration, which the Indian
government could not meet because
the India act provides that the ques-
tion of revision cannot arise for a
period of five years.

ST. LAWRENCE WILL LEAVE TOMORROW FOR SESSION

Fred St. Lawrence, past grand
councillor of the Grand Council of
Ontario and Quebec Commercial
Travellers, will leave London tomor-
row for Columbus, Ohio, where he
will attend the Supreme Council ses-
sion of that order on Tuesday, Wed-
nesday and Thursday of next week.
On Tuesday the new supreme head
office building, costing nearly \$500,000,
will be dedicated in the presence of
many prominent men of the United
States and Canada. The meeting will
be addressed by Senator James E.
Watson, governor of Ohio; the mayor
of Columbus and a leading Canadian
citizen.

Mr. St. Lawrence will be presented
at the supreme session with the
Grand Council charter and the offi-
cial seal for the grand jurisdiction of
Ontario and Quebec.

must move. I am going to take, so
far as I can, every legitimate means
to move it."

PARTS OF HUMANS ARE DUPLICATED

Artificial Kidney Proves Suc-
cessful When Placed in
a Dog.

Powerless to inspire life, twentieth
century scientists have yet gone a
long way toward duplicating certain
parts of the human anatomy. A re-
cently from Baltimore states that
Dr. John Jacob Abel, professor of
pharmacology at the Johns Hopkins
Hospital, has devised an artificial
kidney which has successfully served
its purpose when the experiment was
made on a dog. Dr. Abel is not
known to have tried his experiment
on a human being.

Dr. Abel, whose reputation as a
scientist is of a very high order, has
issued no statements concerning his
artificial organ. Report has it that
the invention consists of a glass
cylinder about the size of an ordinary
tin can. Small tubes made of a spe-
cial material called celloidion run
from end to end of the cylinder on
the inside.

The remaining space in the cylin-
der is filled with a solution of com-
mon salt in water, which duplicates
in its chemical properties and other-
wise the liquid part of the blood.
This salt solution is in constant cir-
culation, running in at one of the
upper ends of the cylinder and out
at one of the lower ends.

When the artificial kidney is func-
tioning, one end of the series of small
celloidion tubes is connected with the
vein of the dog, exactly as a dog's
just before the blood stream reaches
the celloidion tubes, there is poured
into it a small amount of extract of
this provides the explanation of why the
further development of the artificial
kidney has been delayed for several
years.

Without the extract of leeches, the
blood would quickly coagulate or
solidify in the artificial kidney. The
leech is a blood sucker, but before it
starts to draw blood from anyone,
it injects into his veins a small
amount of a secretion which makes
the blood flow freely and prevents
coagulation.

DATA OF FIRE DEPT. PREPARED BY CHIEF

Mayor Asks List of Ages, the
Time of Service and Record
of Promotions.

Fire Chief Aitken has drawn up a
list of the ages and time of service
of the men in his department for
the mayor, showing the date of all
promotions. The mayor asked for
this in committee some time ago
so that he could follow the system
of making promotions in the depart-
ment.

The age limit as set by the fire
bylaw beyond which a man cannot
join the force used to be 28, and is
now 35. There are some men who
are getting on in years, but over
this age, but the chief explains that
this was due to the scarcity of men,
and that there was no other means
of getting men on the department.
The new men who have been taken
on in the last few weeks since the
council granted permission for the
chief to increase his force by an
annual pay roll of \$10,000, are all
under 25.
