Youngster Unperturbed When Questioned by Detroit Police.

FOUGHT ABOUT DOLL

Detroit, Nov. 6.—Police investigation of the probably fatal shooting of 5-year-old Mary Serafino by her 7-year-old brother, Peter, were hampered today by the boy's attitude which said plainly that he was not the one whose business it was to shoot his sister.

Peter frankly resented interruption of his romping at the women's detention home, where this strangest of slayers—for Mary is dying—is held for want of a better place.

Juvenile authorities declined him as being too young.

"Sure I shot her. I was mad at her," Peter admitted, and resumed play impatiently. His whole bearing indicated that so far as the incident it was merely an incident, and a closed one at that.

The Serafinos live at 1516 Clinton street. Mrs. Jennie Serafino, 37, children's mother, had gone to the store, leaving Peter in charge of Mary, Jennie, 2, and Frank, three months old. Peter and Mary disagreed over a big red doll, named "Mary Ann." That led to the shooting.

Mrs. Serafino returned home to find Mary unconscious on the bed, a bullet hole in her forehead.

"She fell down," Peter explained, and went on with his play. Mrs. Serafino snatched the girl from the bed and ran ten blocks to the receiving hospital. Police took Peter to headquarters, where he admitted the shooting. He was questioned later at the detention home.

"She called me a monkey and wouldn't let me take her doll," he said. "I hit her with a stick and she hit me back. It made me mad."

"I got the keys to the drawer where my dad keeps his gun. He had showed me how it worked. I pulled the trigger with both hands, and Mary fell."

His story came out piecemeal, at the insistent urging of John V. Brennan, assistant prosecutor, Inspector Amos Kunkel, and Detective-Inspector Henry Shook.

At no time did he exhibit emotion. When told his sister was dying, he retorted impatiently:

"Well I didn't mean to kill her. I'm sorry, and I'll never do it again." He expressed no wish to see her in the hospital, and seemed quite satisfied to romp about the room where he was detained.

WHEREABOUTS OF BARGE UNKNOWN AT LATE HOUR

Steamer Hettler Loses Tow-Barge Crane in Blinding Superior Gale.

Marie, Mich., Nov. 6.—Nothing has been heard up to this evening of the whereabouts of the barge Crane, which broke away from the steamer Hettler in the northwest gale of yesterday. The Hettler reached the Soo today and reported losing her tow about five miles off Crisp Point, the graveyard of the Great Lakes. In a sudden squall with blinding snow. The tow-boat of the steamer was pulled out by the battered tow-barge. The steamer sailed around for an hour or more in a vain effort to locate the barge, which was manned by a crew of eight men and a woman. Nothing could be learned today from the coastguard stations on the south shore as to the fate of the barge. The storm was very severe and all boats that could took to shelter.

WINDSOR WOMAN FREED ON RUM-SELLING CHARGE

The charge was withdrawn when William Stafford, 829 Wyandotte street east, pleaded guilty to having liquor illegally and was fined \$200 by Magistrate W. E. Gundy in Windsor police court today. Two men found in the apartment house pleaded guilty to the charge of illegally selling liquor and were fined \$50 and costs each.

CRITICISM OF SPORT ATTIRE CHALLENGED BY PRINCIPAL

Head of Walkerville Schoolirate at Rev. Pearson's Comparison of Girls' Basketball Uniforms To Burlesque Costumes.

Canadian Press Despatch. Windsor, Nov. 6.—Robt. Meade, principal of the Walkerville high school, has taken issue with Rev. E. A. Pearson of London, Ont., a former Walkerville pastor, on the latter's stand in the basketball attire controversy, which arose in London, when the minister criticized the way basketball was played on the border. Rev. Mr. Pearson is reported to have said that some of the things he saw in the London league while on an investigating committee were "less indiscreet" than what was to be seen during basketball games between girls. Principal Meade has written Mr. Pearson about the matter, and a reply is awaited. "I saw a report concerning Mr. Pearson's statements, and I clipped it out and sent it to him, accompanied by a letter," explained the principal. "I asked him what he meant; if he had noticed anything indiscreet in clothing or conduct at basketball games played in this college, I felt that while he did not mention Walkerville collegiate in his remarks, he apparently meant this institution, because he formerly lived here until just recently." "I inquired among the women members of the teaching staff here and they declared they saw nothing substantiated Pearson's criticisms nor do I," Principal Meade added.

Darrow Instills Mystery Into Detroit Negro Trial

Defence Counsel Produces Two Sheaves of Strange Manuscript, But Refuses To Divulge Contents—State Witnesses Tell of Shooting of Breiner From Home of Sweet.

Associated Press Despatch. Detroit, Mich., Nov. 6.—An element of mystery entered the second day's trial of Dr. and Mrs. Ossiah H. Sweet and nine other negroes today, when two sheaves of manuscript were displayed by the defence during the cross-examination of a state witness by Clarence Darrow, chief of defence counsel.

The sheaves appeared during the cross-examination of Police Lieut. Paul Shellenburger, who had testified yesterday that the shooting from the Sweet house had been unprovoked.

WOMEN SAYS ANDERSON NOT SHOT AT MUSKEGON

Claims Body of Dead Criminal To Be That of Her Brother.

Muskegon, Mich., Nov. 6.—A woman entered the mystery surrounding the body of George "Dutch" Anderson, which lies unclaimed at the Clock morgue here, when she sent a letter to Chief of Police Peter Hansen today, stating that the dead criminal was not Anderson, but her brother.

"Your man killed my brother, not 'Dutch' Anderson," reads the letter, which was mailed in Muskegon and written apparently by a woman who signed herself "Sis."

The letter bears out the mysterious telegram received by Chief Hansen from Muncie, Ind., denying that Anderson is dead.

"Hello, chief—Sorry you have broadcast my death. I am very much alive. You must have the wrong man. I was not in Michigan Saturday night. So get this. Thanks."

The telegram was signed with Anderson's name.
