FOURTH WARDERS TALK

For Nearly Four Hours on the Sewerage By-law.

CONSIDERABLE OPPOSITION.

Mayor Little "Dresses Down" a Coterie of Chronic Kickers,

One hundred and twenty-five ratepayers of the Fourth Ward gathered in the St. George's school-house last night and talked and wrangled over the sewage by-law for nearly four hours. At eight o'clock Mr. Sheldon S. Casey was chosen chairman, and it was nearly midnight before he put a resolution, which was moved by Mr. John Boyd, and declared the meeting adjourned. 
