"Connecticut Blue Laws:"

The Governor and magistrates, convened in General Assembly, and the supreme power under God, of this independent dominion. Conspiracy against the dominion shall be punished with death.

Whosoever says there is a power and jurisdiction above and over this do-minion shall suffer death and the los-

of his property.

Whospever attempts to change or overturn this dominion shall suffer No one shall be a freeman, or give vote, unless he be converted and a mem
