OTTAWA, Aug. 5 .- Marcus Smith, engineer in the Department of Railways and Canals, who on a leave of absence went out Deputy Attorney-General for the Provincial Government, has returned to the city. He says while there he was detained several days by the quarantine. During the delay capitalists from Chicago, who were interested in the Canadian Western railway. were introduced to him by Mr. Rithet, who has taken an active interest in promo ing the railway. From his experience in explorations and surveys in the Dominion Mr. Smith gave them much valuable information respecting the country. He stated that the railway scheme was not yet exactly matured.
