

It is not necessary to rehearse these regulations here, as they are now pretty generally understood, but when I first read the School Act, that section struck me as heing one of the

I hold that the principle of re-warding everyone according to their deeds is a sound one, and is specially adapted to the working of our school system. The change will have the effect of elevating the standard of efficiency in our schools, it will stimulate both teachers and pupils to bagseased diligence, with a view te getting their schools into as high a grade as possible. It will encourage the faithful and competent teacher, and wake up those who are half asleeep.

In the section in which I reside, there has not been much complaint. Our schools were subjected to a thorough examination by Inspector Mullin in September last and classified, and although some, perhaps, did not attain to as bigh a grade as they expected, the classification is generally conceded to be a just one.
