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SECESSIONS TACTICS.

Messrs. McCabe and Jaffray, solicitors for the Mayor and Acting City Solicitor Caswell, sprung upon the meeting at the Pavilion on Friday night as disreputable a piece of tactics as the citizens of Toronto have witnessed for many a day.

There is every reason to believe that the first two named gentlemen had in hand suggesting the opinion, so-called, of Acting City Solicitor Caswell, which the Mayor read to the meeting with so muchunction. These men tried to make out that the existing agreement does not franchise the Sunday franchise, that that franchise is distinct and independent of the city's franchise as a whole.

They were not to be deterred by the fact that the Mayor and Acting City Solicitor are surely beside themselves in publicly admitting statements so damaging to the city's interest. The wording of the agreement itself may not be as clear as it might be, but legal opinion of the highest kind has been obtained on the question, and the opinion is to the effect that the agreement absolutely sets at rest every doubt raised by Messrs. Jaffray and McCabe.

The wily schemers then found themselves driven in a hole, from which they tried to crawl out by claiming that the company was under obligation to pay ADDITIONAL MILEAGE in consideration of the Sunday service, and they even went so far as to suggest arbitration to ascertain what the additional mileage should be.

This contention as to additional mileage is preposterous. The agreement is as plain as day that the mileage charge is fixed and unalterable either up or down, and that the franchise includes the Sunday service. In another column will be found the statement of Mr. James, who passed a resolution at the syndicate that tendered for the franchise.

Mr. James states that his company in making their tender counted on the receipts from the Sunday service as a problem of the company, and not as a condition of the franchise. He made his tender accordingly.

Mr. Jaffray and Mr. McCabe, not two weeks ago, as good as said they would withdraw all opposition to the movement of the company, and only when the pavement dispute with the city they had the audacity to ask for something to be inserted in the new agreement.

They take us to have the agreement changed so as to make the company pay ADDITIONAL MILEAGE. In other words these men were trying to make the company pay blackmail to the city, and threatened to sue if they were not paid what would oppose Sunday cars.

THE APPEAL OF 80,000 CITIZENS. THE SUNDAY CAR QUESTION.

In January, 1922, there were over 10,000 votes polled in favor of a Sunday street car service. These 10,000 votes represent 80,000 of Toronto's population.

Today these 80,000 people make an appeal to their fellow-citizens. Listen! Here is what they say: We jointly control with you, fellow-citizens, the city's street car system. That system, as you know, is lying idle on Sunday. We 80,000 people ask your consent to use the cars on that day. Let us point out why we think you should accede to our request.

What we ask of you is nothing sinful, wrong or immoral. Some of the best men in the city favor our petition. Some ministers of the gospel are among those who make this appeal to you, fellow-citizens. We 80,000 people ask your consent to use the cars on that day. Let us point out why we think you should accede to our request.

We ask of you, fellow-citizens of Toronto, a favor that would be willingly granted to us by the citizens of any of the larger cities of the world. If we appealed to the citizens of Manchester they would grant us our request. If we appealed to Glasgow they would say, "Yes, by all means use the cars," and Dublin would say the same thing, and so would the cities of Australia and the cities of the United States, and of Europe and of Asia.

We request you, fellow-citizens, to allow us to use the cars on Sunday because they will benefit us physically, mentally and morally; because they will tend to make us stronger in mind and body and because they will keep our children in better health. We want them for recreation. We want them for the very reason that incites you, fellow-citizens, to hitch your horses to every available buggy and carriage in the city on Sunday and take you wherever your fancy pleases.

We request you, fellow-citizens, to allow us to use the cars on Sunday because there are 80,000 of us who will be benefited. Our Court of Appeal has decided that the five or ten thousand people who live near Niagara Falls have a right to a Sunday car service merely for sight-seeing. In 1921 there were 80,000 of us here in Toronto who wished the service to meet the various necessities of our complex city life.

We ask you our fellow-citizens to vote for Sunday cars, because by so doing you will uphold the principle of personal freedom, the principle of liberty of conscience. There are many people in this city who imagine they are commissioned by God not only to look after their own morals but to have a care over their fellow-men to see that they too, walk in the right path. These people start out with the assumption that there is only one right path. They imagine that their, and their alone, is the path of righteousness, and they feel justified in using a gad to keep you from straying from that path.

A STRANGE STORY.

A Pump Takes Fire While Joseph's Streets of Water. STONY CREEK, Aug. 20.—Joseph Armstrong, a farmer residing east of Playlaw, in Saltford, related the following incident to a Spectator correspondent yesterday: He stated that on Wednesday night while pumping water from a well in his barn, the pump, an ordinary wooden one, took fire, and a column of fire sprang out of the top of the pump. Mr. Armstrong blew it out. He then called his son and pumped, when again the flames burst from the pump. When extinguished there was a strong gaseous smell through the building. The well is about 14 feet down to the rock, a hole in which is drilled about a quarter of an inch, and is attached to the pump. Previous to Wednesday there was a quantity of water. Since then there is a plentiful supply, but it is of a very sulphurous quality and strongly impregnated with gas. Mr. Armstrong is afraid to use the well for fear of burning his barn.
